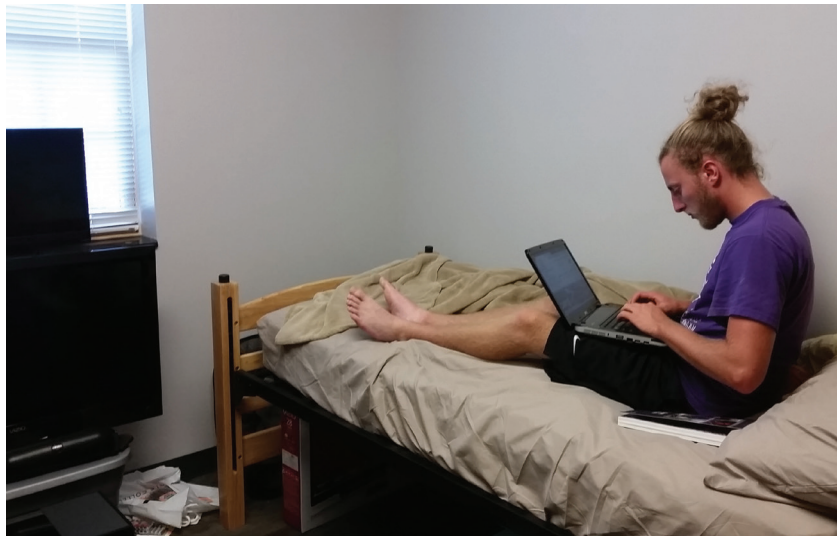


Gate City Livin'

Returning students may have noticed a few changes when they stepped on to Bismarck State College's campus this fall, one including the addition of the Gate City Hall dorm.

Similar to Ritchie Hall, the suites have two bedrooms with four beds, a kitchen, two bathrooms and a washer and dryer. The room size is bigger than Werner and Swensen Halls.

Gate City does not have a recreation room, but students are given keys that allow them to use the recreation room in Ritchie Hall. Because Gate City is a new building, the construction smell still lingers in the hall, but that could soon be taken over with the smell of students cooking.

Last spring during housing registration, returning sophomore Joel Weber requested Gate City as his first pick for dorm assignments.

"I requested this dorm last year and was very excited when I saw I made it in," Weber said.

having to go to a commons area is very nice. However, he said there are few downfalls to the new dorm.

"The shower is not very nice. It barely has any pressure and water doesn't really come out," Weber said.

This dorm is mainly housed with sophomores; however, there were a few freshmen who were assigned a room in Gate City Hall.

"It's fabulous," freshman Chance Roth said. "So much more room and privacy here than in Werner Hall."

Because the dorm is similar to an apartment, Roth said that it gives off a "homey" feel versus living in a small dormroom.

"It does stink a little," Roth said, but overall he said he "really likes" his dorm room.

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Now Hiring?

With the recent oil boom in North Dakota decelerating, more people are finding it difficult to locate employment.

According to www.deptofnumbers.com, North Dakota's unemployment rate has increased from 2.7 percent in August of 2015, to 3.2 percent in 2016. Even though the state's unemployment rate is well below the national average of 4.9 percent, that number is steadily increasing.

Nationwide, the majority of states unemployment rates are decreasing – some even significantly, but North Dakota is only one of few states to witness an increase.

"The collapse of oil prices was a big surprise to everyone – I think we will see things settle down," Mark Butland of Job Service North Dakota said.

Within this optimistic prediction, there are still a few key details that are important to understand.

With unemployment at a recent high, there is now more than ever an increase in individuals wishing to collect benefits and/or help with locating a job. However, the government

agency overseeing this saw a massive decrease in funding this year, which has complicated and slowed down these practices.

Job Service North Dakota is a federally funded agency which assists individuals that are unemployed by providing monetary support, as well as online and inperson resources to locating a new job or career.

According to the Bismarck Tribune, this year Job Service North Dakota saw a reduction enforcement in which 60 employees were left out of work. For an agency already struggling to keep up with the previously high volume of incoming claims cases, this setback is proof that it is exponentially more difficult.

"Our funding has been flat for several years while costs continued to increase," Butland said.

He also said that to keep up with the surplus of cases, his team has took on an "all hands on deck approach," even going as far as borrowing supervisors and managers to help with increase in workload.

Students looking to collect unemployment benefits while searching for a job or career should expect a longer wait for a response when filing, and a more frustrating experience when job hunting.

"Waiting for decisions is difficult for our claimants as you have to keep in mind that these are people who have gone from having an income one day to suddenly no income," Butland said.

Though Job Service recognizes the burden unemployment brings, there is unfortunately little they can do but attempt to create technology to allow for some relief. To combat these setbacks, Job Service has introduced an automated system and user-friendly website. Students can find all the information and resources needed by visiting www.jobsnd.com, or by going to Job Service's local building at 1601 E. Century Ave. in Bismarck. Butland also suggests stopping by our Bismarck State College career center, located on the lower level of the Student Union.

"We don't want that feeling again. No co-champions, we need to be in Nationals," Rosales said.

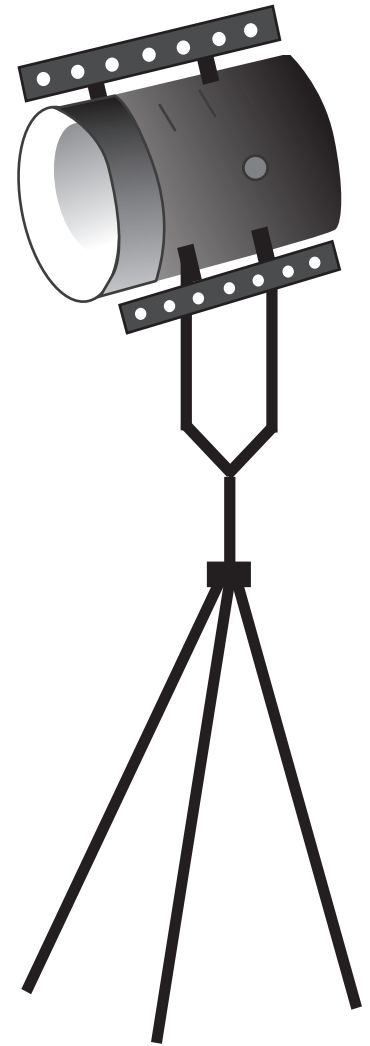
Instead of kicking back for the summer, Rosales spent her time developing

This Kickoff Week is being praised by ESPN as "arguably the greatest opening weekend in college football history."

Rarely do you see this high number of historic powerhouse football universities clashing in the first week of the regular season.

Day in the Life

Carrie Axt points her finger at the word “computer” and his eyes light up. He runs to the interactive whiteboard, ready to play a game. While he struggles to speak out loud, he is able to communicate his basic needs or ideas by using a core vocabulary communication board that has been modified for him. After a few minutes of working, he grabs the card that says “Break” and we celebrate because these little bursts of work mean he is having a productive day.

After spending the day with Axt, one of the speech-language pathologists at Miller Elementary School, it is clear that there are some pretty major misconceptions about what it means to be a speech-language pathologist (SLP).

“There is way more to speech-language pathology than fixing an L, R, or S sound. It’s truly learning to communicate with the people around them,” Axt said.

She helps her students learn to communicate both verbally and nonverbally, and teaches them social cues and expected behaviors. While she primarily works with her students on reading and language arts based activities, she also helps choose math activities for certain students to work on to meet their personal goals. One of her favorite lessons to work on with her students is how to regulate their emotions in social work groups.

Later in the school year, Axt has a more fixed schedule in which she typically sees students individually or in small groups for approximately 20 minute increments. The beginning of the year, however, is dedicated to finding out where each of her students is at and what their academic goals are for the year.

With the help of other specialists, parents, and classroom teachers, Axt develops an individualized education program for each of the students who are eligible for the extra help. She partners with the only other speech therapist in the building to help all of their students adjust to a new classroom environment, a new teacher, and often times a new aide. These changes can be hard for students to process, so Axt makes many of her students visual schedules of what their day will look like so they can see and understand what is supposed to happen next.

She begins this particular day by looking for a math activity appropriate for one of her students. She must cater to his lower cognitive abilities, so she finds a card numbered 1-10 for him to match numbers on. He is only one of many students who Axt will check in on today.

There is a shortage of speech language pathologists in the area. Axt travels to another school in the area for a few hours two days a week to help the students there, along

with the students she sees at Miller. She very rarely finishes her day before 5 p.m., even though her official work hours are 7:45a.m. to 3:45 p.m. Her long hours can in part be attributed to her passion for trying to find the perfect lesson plans for each child.

“I have to remind myself that I don’t have to solve it all today,” Axt said.

Even so, the amount of work she accomplishes in one day is quite impressive. Her goal is to help her students do some of the things their peers can do; she also helps to get them integrated into the regular classroom as much as possible, although for some students, being in the regular classroom even fifty percent of the time is too much. Often times, students must go to a sensory room to take a break. Things in this room include a trampoline, a hug machine, a lava lamp, a stationary bike, a swing, and much more. Many of Axt’s students respond better when presented with different kinds of sensory stimulation; usually this is visual or tactile.

Often times, people can forget about the language part of Speech Language Pathology. Axt focuses on all types of communication, helping her students understand body language, the language they hear spoken by their teachers, and written language.

“School is a language rich environment,” Axt said.

It is her job to make sure her students are learning to process all the different kinds of language they experience on a day to day basis in whatever way works best for each individual. The approach she takes varies greatly from one child to the next. This okay with Axt, who states this as her favorite part of the job.

“Really just finding unique ways to look at kids,” Axt said. “Taking time to do something different is worth it.”

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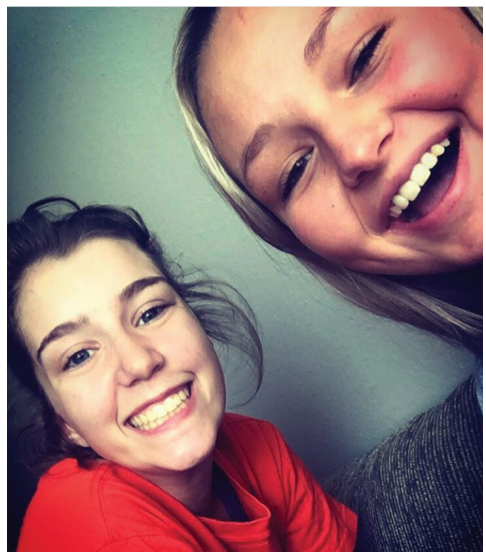

King of Fighters XIV: Taking the Crown

King of Fighters XIV may not be as gorgeous as this year's Street Fighter V, but like in love and fighting games, looks are not everything. In an era where DLC practices have been known to strip a game to the bare bones, King of Fighters XIV brings more than enough features and fighters to keep players on cloud nine for the long haul.



The King of Fighters series dates back to the late 90's and was created as a crossover series expanding the rosters of SNK's arcade fighting franchise. Many of these games were periscope by the success of the Street Fighter and Mortal Kombat series in the U.S., but were a step in evolution for the fighting genera. For those who can remember back to such titles as Fatal Fury, Samurai Shodown and Art of Fighting, will find most of the familiar faces making their next gen debuts.

SNK fighting games, the King of Fighters series in particular, are renowned for their AAA quality hand drawn animations. This year, rather than continuing with the hand drawn stylings, SNK has elected to go with full 3D models for the fighters and arenas. The translation from these two mediums is not as elegant as the Street Fighter V visuals but what King of Fighters XIV loses in appearance it makes up in gameplay and features.

King of Fighters XIV maintains the 3-vs-3 fighting system from its previous entries. Players pick three fighters and face an opponent team in one round single elimination bouts

till one team is eliminated. There is no tagging fighters mid battle or team-up combos. Any of the fighters can be selected to make a team, but certain teams can yield special endings after defeating the final boss.

With 50 fighters to choose from, making a team that caters to strengths and shelters flaws is quite simple. There are powerful wrestlers, speedy ninjas, techy cyborgs, cool truckers, ruthless assassins, hot anime chicks, hulking soldiers and even a dinosaur grappler. Whatever your taste may be, there is bound to be a flavor of fighter for you.

The game is fought in classic 90's style. While the graphics may have shifted to the three dimensional realm, the game is still played on a 2D plain. The fighting is smooth, the commands are responsive and the characters are as flashy as ever. Super moves and MAX moves are simple to activate and a rush to watch unfold on opponents.




To make the game more accessible for players new to the series SNK added the "Rush Attack" system. This system allows for players to pull off a combo string by repeatedly tapping the jab button at close quarters. The severity of the combo is based on the player's level gauge during the match. While most advanced players will avoid this system for their own custom combos, new players can now enter the game with a consistency across characters and even a means to victory.

King of Fighters XIV features an arcade/story mode, trials, survival, time attack, online and training modes. In the era of DLC, it was nice to purchase a complete game at launch. The story mode is nothing ground breaking and follows the clichés of most classic fighting games.



Fight 10 rounds, fight a mid-boss, fight a final boss and receive an ending. With multiple ending, tons of icons and pieces of artwork to unlock, the game will keep you playing through multiple times to see it all. The game even unlocks the boss and mid-boss free of charge if you beat the game (that is a rarity anymore).

As of this point in the year, The King of Fighters XIV is the fighting game to play. The characters may not be recognizable to most gamers of this generation, but hidden underneath the strangers and less than perfect visuals lies a solid fighting game with a large roster and many modes of play.

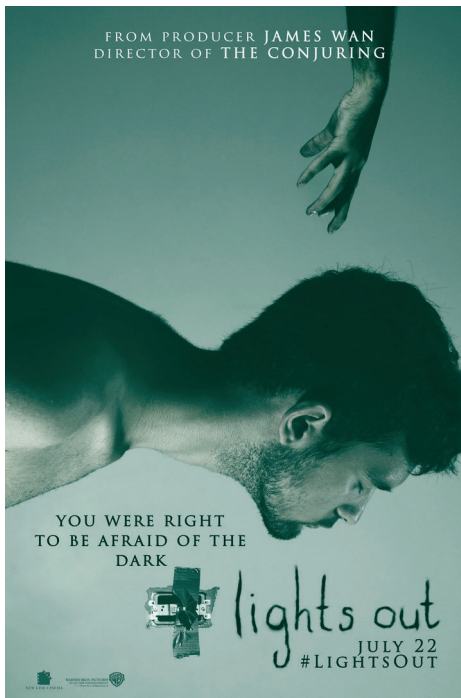

Lights Out: Fear of the Dark

Channeling the fear of the dark that we all felt as children and that sometimes follows us into adulthood late at night, *Lights Out* is a supernatural flick based on the short film of the same name from 2013 directed by David Sandberg. The 2016 film takes the basic premise of the short film and gives it a little more depth.



Lights Out follows the terrifying story of an understandably dysfunctional family. After the death of his father, Martin must deal with his mother's deteriorating mental health as she talks to her friend "Diana" who Martin cannot see. Rebecca, Martin's estranged sister, must attempt to save her family from

the malicious entity she first met in her childhood.

This movie gets straight to the point. There is no montage of happy faces pretending everything is okay at the beginning, and that's something I can appreciate. I'm going to a scary movie to be scared, not watch some feel-good family exposition just to have it revealed later on that they are all actually super messed up, and this movie skips the bull to get right to the scares. *Lights Out* features plenty of jump scares to get your heart pumping and make your body jolt in your seat.

That being said, this movie also plays right into the stereotypical horror movie with characters who make obviously stupid choices. Characters go toward the scary noise, investigate the creepy basement, or don't turn on the lights in a house with a being who can only exist in the dark. Thankfully, there seems to be a bit of character development, and this overused naïveté is mostly limited to the first half of the movie.

The cast of the movie is really what makes *Lights Out* stand out from other horror films. Gabriel Bateman, at only 10 years old, really shines in his perfor-



mance as brave yet terrified Martin. He may be the only character who does what seems rational to all of us when we're scared: hide behind the covers with the lights on.
