

Graff Leads 2017 Mystic Volleyball Team

On Aug. 14, 2017, the Bismarck State College Mystic volleyball team dove right into their pre-season week with sophomore team captain, Sierra Graff leading the way. The Mystics are coming off last year's sub-regional championship win and have high expectations for the 2017 season. Graff was voted the 2017 Mystics volleyball team co-captain.

"I am extremely excited for our 2017 season," Graff said. "We have a great team coming in: great freshmen and great sophomores. I think our overall team chemistry this year is going to be amazing and help us go really far.

Graff's path to success had humble beginnings that started in the small town of Kindred, N.D..

"I was recruited by the 2015-2016 BSC assistant coach, Josh Wastvedt, which really caught me off guard because I didn't get to play my senior year of high school due to an injury," Graff said. "Basically when I got that offer, I was already mentally signed."

Prior to her injury, Graff was a standout athlete. As a high school freshman, she helped lead her team to the state championship where they took home the North Dakota Class B State Title. Three years later, having only played four games before suffering a season ending injury, she made the

all-region volleyball team.

Graff immediately established a strong chemistry with the coaching staff at BSC and still has that connection today.

"I absolutely love our coaching staff," Graff said. "I think they are great; each one has a different view on different things and they all mesh well together. They have so much knowledge of the game which makes it so fun."

When asked about her feelings towards her teammates, she quickly said with a smile on her face, "I love them. I love them all."

Graff's love for the game, as well as her coaches and teammates clearly shows through when she is out on the court, and now that she is a team captain her role means even more to her.

"I find this opportunity as a huge honor," Graff said. "I'm glad that I am able to be a person who the girls look up to and get to be that role model and hopefully be that person who is a great leader and help them through anything they need help with, Graff said. "I try to stay positive on the court. I know everybody makes mistakes. Sometimes a lot of people take that harder than others so I try to be that person to pick them up."

The Bismarck State Volleyball team feeds off of Graff's positive energy and leadership. With her on their side, watch for them to make another return to the sub-regional championship.

Black Board: Students and Faculty Face Challenge

Some students who have attended college would probably say that the first couple weeks as a freshman can be intimidating. Between making sure classes and books are paid for, learning how to use e-mail, online campus, campus connection, navigating student housing, meal plans, can all be a huge stress.

Now with Bismarck State College adopting a new online campus called Black Board – everybody is having to learn the ropes. The freshman probably have it easier off than anybody else as the sophomores and faculty have to relearn everything.

"I can see the benefits of it," David Poffenberger, assistant professor of mathematics said. "It gives the campus

a uniform feel, everyone is on the same playing field."

Sophomores have to get used to this new way of thinking too. For some it might be challenging and for others it will not be an issue at all.

"I haven't used it much yet," Jesse Gilbertson, engineering technology sophomore at BSC, said. "I like that the classes show up in one place instead of having to exit out of one course and into another."

Black Board can be compared to any other computer program in that until the user gets used to it, it could be considered a challenge.

"The more I work with it the more I like

it," Poffenberger said. "I think it is important that when students log into online campus they are comfortable. There would be unity on campus."

BSC has on-campus classes as well as online classes. This year many faculty are using Black Board in their classrooms. This is the challenge: having online in addition to on-campus classes.

Poffenberger said teachers should decide if on campus should be like online, but he isn't doing it that way.

"In a discipline like mathematics, teachers might want to see the student's thought process and see exactly how their solution derived with all steps shown," Poffenberger said.

Poffenberger isn't against using Black Board, he thinks it has quite a few great tools. He incorporates it heavily into his ASC courses with quizzes, discussions, videos and practice problems.

"I have the syllabus, gradebook, videos and assessment questions up on my Black Board for my other classes such as college algebra, just as I did in the old system," Poffenberger said. "I believe the goal is to start using it as a work horse tool to gather data related to course assessment – assessment for course learning outcomes."

From a student perspective Gilbertson may have put it best when he said, "I'm sure it will be fine once everyone gets used to it."

News Briefs Students Choose Living Options

BSC in Top Five

Bismarck State College made the top five listing in the 2017 Top Online Colleges for Student Economic Mobility.

Schools were eligible for inclusion in this report if they had a mobility rate in the top 20 percent of schools offering 10 or more fully online degrees at the associate level or higher. Of the 2,273 colleges considered, 97 made the cut. Schools were analyzed based on mobility rate data provided by the Equality of Opportunity Project, and all college tuition rates were manually researched by SR Education Group. Again, Bismarck State College was ranked number five.

NRC Scholarships

Bismarck State College has received a \$140,934 grant from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission which will be used to fund 18 scholarships for qualified students enrolling in BSC's Nuclear Power Technology program over the next two academic years.

UTTC Powwow



Sonic Mania: A Retro Romance

Sonic the Hedgehog is most known for speed and not taking a backwards step. After many recent missteps with the Sonic franchise, it appears the best step for the world's fastest Hedgehog was not forward, but backwards. In this year's Sonic Mania, Sonic returns to what made him a gaming icon – Fast and furious side scrolling action.

Sonic Mania was released on Aug. 8 for the PS4, Nintendo Switch and Xbox One. The game was developed by PagodaWest and Headcannon Games and published by Sega. Sonic Mania was released for the 25th anniversary of Sonic the Hedgehog.

Sonic Mania is directly inspired by the early Sonic games of the Sega Genesis system. Sonic is back to his side scrolling roots and his 16-bit form. This Sonic adventure is played across 12 zones, each with two acts, as Sonic is hot on the heels of the evil Dr. Eggman in attempt to end the madman's latest plan for world domination.

Many of the levels reappear from the Sega Genesis era Sonic games. The opening level is none other than Green Hill Zone, the first zone from the original 1991 Sonic the Hedgehog. As the player advances through the game it becomes obvious that the levels have been remixed and changed to keep the gameplay fresh while at the same time maintaining the nostalgia factor. Sonic Mania features a few new zones, but is mainly comprised of zones from the original series.

The levels are played in classic Sonic fashion. Players race through the acts collecting rings to survive while utilizing a series of power ups to aid Sonic in his quest. At the end of every act there is a boss waiting



to test the player's skills. Each level increases difficulty attempting to burn through the player's lives. Sonic Mania features a save system, but the player must restart the zone if all their lives are depleted.

Gamers are not limited to playing only as Sonic. His friends, Tails and Knuckles, are also available to play as. While the story does not change depending on what character you choose, each of the three characters do have their own unique skills and abilities. Sonic can run the fastest and jump the highest, Tails can fly with the use of his siamese tails, and Knuckles can glide and climb walls. This element makes replaying the game more enjoyable and diverse.

On top of rushing the levels and smashing Dr. Eggman's creations, there

are a series of special stages to keep the gameplay varied. There are two types of special stages. The first special stage is a throwback to Sonic 3 in which the players must traverse a 3D sphere collecting blue orbs. Success in these special stages unlock medals which in turn unlock game secrets and different modes of play.

The second special stage type is found by locating the secret zones within each of the acts. These special stages are a throwback to Sonic CD. The player must run down one of Dr. Eggman's robots in a Mario Kart esque race game. By completing this type of special stage, the player will collect one of the seven Chaos Emeralds. By collecting all these emeralds, powered up versions of the characters will become available and unlock the game's true ending.

For a skilled player, the game can be beaten within a couple hours.

Attempting to collect all the emeralds for Sonic Mania's true ending is wherein the challenge lies. The levels are beautifully drawn and the HD character sprites are charismatic. Sonic Mania offers a fun gaming experience that will require multiple playthroughs to see all it has to offer, but will leave most gamers wanting a few more levels.

The Minnesota Vikings are looking to become only the third team to ever play a Super Bowl in their home stadium this year. Super Bowl LII will take place at U.S. Bank Stadium, the home of the Minnesota Vikings.

With Sam Bradford at quarterback and the signings of tackles Riley Reiff and Mike Remmers to an otherwise underwhelming offensive line, the Vikings are definitely striving to be competitors in the upcoming season. The Vikings also acquired much needed young talent through the draft, most notably Dalvin Cook. Cook is a 5' 10" 210 lb running back from Florida State. looking to build off their 10-6 finish and division title in 2016. Wide receiver Jordy Nelson's health will also play a major role in the Packers' 2017 success. Nelson missed the entire 2015 season after tearing his ACL in a preseason game. Aaron Rodgers will need to have a good season again to help lead the way as well.

After placing third in the NFC North division, only ahead of the 3-13 Chicago Bears last year, the Vikings will hope their youth will make for a strong playoff run. The Bears are a team with a lot of youth at key positions. One possible quarterback option is rookie, Mitchell Trubisky. This 23-year-old standing at 6'3" and weighing a solid 222 lbs was selected second overall in the 2017 draft.

Chicago will be hoping for similar campaign to last year's from second year running back Jordan Howard. He rushed for 1,313 yard on 252 attempts in 2016 and produced six rushing touchdowns and one receiving.

The Bears will look to Kevin White as a passing target after he was limited to just four games during an injury-plagued rookie season in 2016. Adding Victor Cruz to the receiving core this offseason will help in the passing game.

Another young team competing with the Vikings for the 2017 NFC North title is the Detroit Lions. The Lions are riding on the hopes of yet another

successful season from Matthew Stafford. Stafford has averaged 61.5 completion percentage and an 86.8 QB rating over his first eight seasons in the NFL. The 29-year-old quarterback has managed to remain healthy every game over his last 6 seasons, so the Lions will count on his durability.

Stafford will rely on both veteran receiver Golden Tate and rookie Kenny Golladay to provide majority of the receiving game in the 2017 season. Most of the rushing will be done by three year veteran Ameer Abdullah who appeared minimally during an injury-plagued 2016 campaign.

The Lions will hope to better their respectable 9-7, 2nd in NFC North finish last year. The Lions defense will be asked to produce great play lead by veterans Naloti Ngata, Ezekiel Ansah and Tahir Whitehead who were the big time players for the Lions in 2016.

The Vikings will have a lot of competition as they anticipate a possible playoffs appearance in 2017. Health will be a major key for many of the Vikings players especially the offensive line which was tarnished by them just a year ago, but they feel that they have the depth to compete.

The combination of youth and veterans the Vikings bring to play on Monday, September 11 as they take on former Vikings running back Adrian Peterson and the New Orleans
