BSC EMBARKS ON ONE OF A KIND PROJECT

Last year, Bismarck State College Innovations Foundation finalized a project between the campus and the National Power Academy (NPA) in the country of Saudi Arabia to provide non-credit training to students pursuing a career in energy. This led to a few changes at the college. This is part of Saudi Arabia's 2030 Vision which includes educating and training Saudi nationals to support their workforce needs in IT, and it may be used in the future for similar projects around the world.

"There are a lot of places interested in what BSC has," other institutions, it's a great honor,' and we really do see it that way."

There were other controversial decisions made by the

"This project is now approaching about six months, and we've learned a lot," Bruce Emmil, the Dean of the National Energy Center of Excellence said.

BSC Innovations Foundation signed a five-year contract with the NPA on this energy specific project, but it's not the only college expanding offerings to Saudi Arabia.

"There are about 20 other [colleges] from around the world that have partnered with Saudi Arabia on this kind of training program," Emmil said. health care, energy and more.

The Innovations Foundation has a cost plus contract. This means that Saudi Arabia is paying not only the tuition cost back to BSC for students in the program, but also all of the costs, and an added revenue percentage for the project with doing business in Saudi Arabia.

This contract was established after six months of negotiations and limits the overall risk of the project. It has the potential to generate significant money and bring these funds back to BSC. In order to protect BSC and the current BSC foundation, a new foundation was formed. The Innovation Foundation

was created for this purpose,

Emmil said. "When Saudi Arabia sent out their request for proposal (RFP), BSC responded to it ..., but when they visited our campus they basically said, 'It looks like we generated our RFP based on what you guys have right here in Bismarck."

Saudi Arabia could be seen as a controversial choice for BSC to partner with and some have gone so far as to call the decision "bigoted," because of Saudi Arabia's perceived autocratic nature. Emmil sees it differently.

"We had some discussion about it, but a lot of people were saying, 'to get picked as the sole provider of this kind of program, out of an international search of all these Saudis.

"They initially noted through the RFP, 'we would be required to only have male employees," Emmil said, "But just six months into the contract we already have two female employees working there now, and (NPA) is even talking about making it the first program... to potentially allow female students. To be part of this transformable change in Saudi Arabia is something that BSC should be very proud of."

To date, the project has been providing enough revenue for the college to continue its lease on the Meadowlark Building on the north side of campus.







COMMUNITY GAINS INTEREST IN SCIENCE

Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics affect nearly everything in our lives. Students getting involved with clubs and activities that promote creativity and leadership, such as the STEM Spectacular, can benefit society. Many students who are not in science or engineering classes are not sure how to get involved with clubs in these fields. The STEM Spectacular, which involved the community with interesting science projects, allowed students and adults to come together and learn how important science is to our lives. It also provides a chance to partake in fun activities that engage everyone. Courtney Stoltz, Educational Outreach Director at the Gateway to Science center, hosts four STEM Spectacular events a year, the next one will be April 27. These events are vital for inspiring students with science.

"The STEM Spectacular puts an effort to ignite the scientist in all of us" Stoltz said. "These events help kids with hands-on projects and helps kids collaborate and communicate with others." Science has advanced our society in so many ways. Chemistry, agriculture, physics, and medical sciences are examples of how advanced our lives have become.

"Without science, we would not have a huge number of things we have today. We would not have technology, but we also would not be able to keep track of weather conditions and meteorology."

The Bismarck State College is actively participating in activities throughout the community. Tony Musumba, associate professor of physics and adviser of the STEM club, partakes in student-initiated meetings every two weeks to discuss STEM activities. There are many events taking place this semester.

"Engineering Week is taking place on February 16 at the Kirkwood Mall. We will also be doing a balloon launch in the spring" Musumba said. "Clubs are for students to use their leadership, work in groups, and make new friends. There are other clubs such as Women In Science, Engineering, and Skilled Trades and Amateur Radio club that are good for students."

BSC Sophomore Andrew Schafer, a civil engineering sophomore and

president of the STEM club, says that the upcoming engineering week allows a chance for engineering firms and students to come together.

"Engineering firms come from the Bismarck-Mandan area and help students find their career path." STEM club also volunteers with the North Dakota Society of Professional Engineers.

McKenna Wilson, a freshman majoring in respiratory therapy at the University of Mary, was a volunteer at the STEM Spectacular.

"I took advanced chemistry, physics, biology, and tons of other STEM classes at Underwood High School" said Wilson.

"STEM clubs and activities are good for the community. It teaches them about leadership, science, and creativity." Wilson also stated that getting involved with STEM clubs can help students with their leadership skills and career path, no matter what the major.

The community involved themselves with many interesting and educational activities at the STEM Spectacular. A

So far this season, Stevahn has started all twenty games for the Mystics, averaging 23.7 points per game. She's also currently sitting at the number one spot in the nation for points per game in Division II National Junior College Athletic Association Women's Basketball.

"There is a little bit of pressure," Stevahn said, "but I just try to push it in the back of my mind and I just take what the game gives me and try my hardest all the time."

Keeping that average for twenty games is impressive and takes a lot of preparation and time in the gym. Stevahn is constantly found in the gym on any given day working on her craft. She said that she comes in two hours before the game to prepare for the night with teammate Courtney Olson.

Stevahn is averaging a 55 field goal percentage and 64.4 percent from the free throw line so far this season.

This achievement doesn't go unnoticed from her teammates on the court, as they have confidence in her that she will make her shots on any given night.

"She's so hard working that we give her the ball knowing that she is going to put it in the hoop," BSC Freshmen Forward Sydney Andersen said. "I give her the ball and I don't even second guess it that she is going to do what is best for the team."

Stevahn, Andersen and the rest of the women's basketball squad will play their final regular season home game on Feb. 18, as they take on Lake Region State College at the BSC Armory with tip off starting at 5:30 p.m.







CONSPIRACY CORNER: MAKING MOON MOVES

With China's recent landing on the far and "dark" side of the moon, many questions have been brought up. Some asked for the first time, yet others have never been answered.

Why is China the first to go to the far side? Why have we not been back to the moon in decades? Why after all this time and a few manned moon missions, are we only sending rovers to a remote yet supposedly reachable part of our solar system?

Many people have speculated what would be found on the far side of the moon. Theories range from alien moon bases, to human moon bases, and there are even some theories of structures and beings on that close space relative of ours.

According to People's Daily, China @ PDChina on Twitter, the plants sprouted, "marking humankind's first biological experiment on the moon." The question: are these the only forms of life on the moon? Are the canister and the Earth-sent rovers the only structures on the moon?

As far back as Apollo 11, astronauts and NASA scientists have been quoted and continue to say that we are not alone in this universe. Apollo 11 gave us photos that are still scrutinized today, showing domes and "buildings" — some hidden deep down in the depths of craters.

The moon itself is an oddity in space: it's relatively large size, its low mass, the certain way it dances with its partner Earth around the sun in space. The smallest of impacts can cause Apollo installed seismometers to show the moon as "ringing like a bell," said Clive R, professor of civil engineering and geological sciences at the University of Notre Dame. Neal continued on in a meeting of NASA's Lunar Exploration Analysis Group and found on NASA's website. He went on explaining how, "The moon is seismically active," and other oddities.

We are constantly looking for answers in the vastness of our world. Recently, we have started looking for answers on other worlds. A lot of these answers have brought up more questions, but that is part of the adventure of knowledge.

Some of these "out there" conspiracy theories claim the moon is a "satellite" or created object used to do an array of things in its partnership with our planet Earth. These might be questions that China's Chang'e 4 rover is looking in to.

To learn, we must ask, and to ask is to explore. Let's continue to explore the possibilities and wonders that lie on our companion, the moon, and elsewhere in our vast, crazy universe.

GIVE SEQUELS A CHANCE

Sequels fall into a mixed bag ranging from marvels to travesties in all forms of media, and video games have no exception to the rule. I remember feeling awestruck by the first five hours of "Kingdom Hearts II" and laughing at the absurdity of "Resident Evil 6." Imagine the great amount of surprise for me last year as 2018 showed its good side and proved itself as a great year for video game sequels. This pleasant surprise demonstrates that in a world of new games and spiritual successors, there stands a place for returns and reimaginings of storied franchises. The game "God of War (2018)" exists as the best example of what 2018 brought to gaming. The first game titled "God of War" released in 2005 by developer SCE Santa Monica Studios, followed a Spartan soldier in Greece named Kratos, who was tricked by the Greek god Ares into killing his family, sparking violence and anger in Kratos leading him on a warpath of

revenge against Ares and the Greek pantheon. The game contained good combat. decent platforming mechanics and a solid story that mirrored Greek tragedies and epics that inspired western storytelling. "God of War" became a success critically and financially, which of course meant that it would receive a sequel. The development team at SCE Santa Monica Studios underwent changes to staff for developing the sequel. Changes included former director of the first game, David Jaffe, stepping down and relinquishing the position to Cory Barlog. The game "God of War" turned into a successful trilogy, but with the success, the series lost direction. Originally an action game paying homage to the storytelling of the classics, it became filled with violence, not for the sake of a good story but for the sake of violence. "God of War 2" and "God of War 3" were needlessly violent and continuations of a story already finished. "God of War" was a great game by all

standards but with all the uncomfortable violence and poor handling of mature, graphic content in the sequels, the trilogy was bogged down as a whole.

mechanics, the game was hard to bear for the uninitiated Cancom, the developer and publisher of the "Monster Hunter" series, could clearly see the appeal of the series to those who weren't fans and decided to make a change in the newest iteration, "Monster Hunter: World." While "God of War (2018)" redeemed the series with a story worth telling, "Monster Hunter: World" made changes to allow accessibility for novice players and a refreshing new world for veterans of the franchise. 2018 was a great year for games and most notably sequels to intellectual properties refusing to stagnate. In fact, there are many great sequels lined up this year, such as "The Last of Us Part II" and "Psychonauts 2" that I am excited to see take a page from the books of these two. If developers and publishers take proper notes from the 2018 trends in sequels to improve or revisit established properties, 2019 and years to follow will lead to success and happy fans.

Last year was the debut of a genuinely good sequel that solved the problem caused by the trilogy in the release of "God of War (2018)." The story follows our protagonist Kratos not as the vengeful god he became at the end of the first three games, but now as a father in the far north, journeying with his son to deliver his wife's ashes to the top of a mountain. The story, formerly paved in blood, becomes an action-packed tale of fatherhood and adventure in the land of gods Kratos doesn't know, and it is a thrill ride worth taking.

Not only did "God of War" get a muchneeded sequel rebranding but so did Capcom's "Monster Hunter."

"Monster Hunter" was a game known for battles against large monsters. While fun for fans that understood the
