CAUTION ADVISED IN CROSSWALKS

Safety is an important thing when going anywhere. The Bismarck State College police are committed to ensuring the safety of as many people as possible. Typically the last thing anyone wants is to sustain an injury when going about their business. Here is what can be done to get to any destination safely.

"Since August, there had been four to five people hit in the crosswalk, all to varying degrees of severity," BSC Officer Mark Thueson said.

When an accident happens, remaining as calm as possible is helpful so as not to cause more panic during the already stressful situation. Thueson also gave some advice if there were to be a passerby to an accident on the crosswalk.

"If you have a phone with you, call 911 because that's the most important thing," Thueson said.

When walking around campus it is key to ensure it's clear to cross. Everyone, students, faculty and staff should err on the side of caution when moving across the street.

"When crossing the street, I feel like I am safe because most cars stop right there and uncommonly would go pretty slow." Dustin Wintermeyer, a student at BSC, said. "I haven't really encountered anything that has put my life into danger."

During Christmas break, BSC placed two flashing crosswalk signs along Schafer Street. These lights are continuously flashing to get the driver's attention and notify them of the crosswalk.

"I feel like it helps put awareness a little more, and it helps people see oh hey there's probably people crossing this way," Wintermeyer said.

A question posed is whether BSC should add more of these flashing crosswalk signs. There are multiple opinions on the subject.

"If we get too many lights flashing, they kinda fade into the background and people lose interest," Officer Thueson said.

"I feel like it's good the way it is except for on the street that leads up to Werner Hall," Wintermeyer said.

That street is Edwards Avenue. It is a spot of concern due because of the hill and the crosswalks not always being visible when on either side of said hill. As well as the fact cars are parking right up to the crosswalk making it even harder to see the pedestrians in the crosswalks.

Thueson also said that the no parking signs on the streets are

there for the safety of both the driver and the pedestrian. The other issue is drivers that are distracted by anything causing them to not pay as much attention to the road as they should. "Anytime that people are driving, they should have their phone nowhere near them," Officer Thueson said.

Overall BSC's campus is safe

to walk through, except for a few accidents or close calls that have happened. If anyone sees an accident, report it to 911 immediately to provide the best help they can.



BSC STUDENTS SPEND SPRING BREAK IN SPAIN

While the average Bismarck State College student is going home or sleeping all day this upcoming spring break, a group of BSC students consisting of a joint venture between BSC's Agricultural and History departments are taking a trip to Spain. They are leaving on Wednesday, Feb. 28 and returning on Friday, March 8. The first four days are going to be spent in the city of Barcelona and the last four days will be spent in the capital city of Madrid. As this is a trip for both history and agricultural students there are elements of both used in the travel itinerary. This will be happening while the agricultural students are taking guided tours of an organic farm, vineyard, an olive grove and a dairy producer.

All of the students will be taking a Spanish cooking class and they will also attend a Flamenco performance, which is a form of dance that was pioneered by the Roma people in southern Spain. This trip was planned by and is led by Assistant Professor Marko Davinic and Assistant Professor Harlee Kilber from the agricultural department and Assistant Professor David Terry from the history department.

The history students will be taking tours of cultural sites, such as the Sagrada Familia Cathedral, which originally started construction in 1882 and is still not finished. This is because of multiple design changes, funding issues and postponements because of crises like the Spanish Civil War in 1936 and COVID-19 in 2020. The students will also be visiting the Prado Art Museum in Barcelona that opened in November 1819 and holds paintings from legendary Spanish artists like Francisco Goya. BSC Student Colton Markel said he is very excited to go. He said the main thing he is looking forward to is using the knowledge he has acquired from Spanish history and language classes he has taken at BSC to help him navigate in a real life context. He said he is also excited to try the food, specifically Jamón ibérico, which is a cured ham leg that is carved by a sword. This is his first time going out of the country, as he just got his passport last fall. BSC PROVIDES RESOURCES FOR RED ZONE VICTIMS Students encouraged to reach out for help

Over 50% of all college sexual assaults have been statistically found to occur from the beginning of the fall semester through Thanksgiving break. This time period is referred to as the Red Zone.

The time period of the Red Zone is not coincidental as it lines up with the arrival of returning upperclass students and the arrival of freshmen students, who are typically less familiar with the campus environment. These students may be away from friends and family and may be experiencing living on their own for the first time, putting them in a vulnerable position.

Bismarck State College has a Title IX policy. Title IX is a federal law that prohibits sexual violence and discrimination on campuses and within their activities. This policy ensures that students feel safe to report these instances of sexual misconduct.

Kaylyn Bondy is BSC's Vice President of Student Affairs as well as the Title IX Coordinator.

"We are obliged to follow all of those federal policies," Bondy said. "As a part of those federal policies is to educate to create awareness and educate to prevent these types of occurrences, or when made aware of, to stop second occurrences from happening."

For many students, it is helpful to know ways in which they can keep themselves safe on campus, one of which is awareness around substance use. stay safe on campus is to make sure they know who they are spending time with.

"As you are out and about and going out with friends, knowing your environment, I think is important," Bondy said.

These occurrences can also happen within relationships. Because of this, it is important to establish boundaries and have proper communication.

"Knowing how to communicate I think is an important thing for not just students, but really anybody to be able to create that environment within a relationship to have a healthy relationship with clear and healthy boundaries," Bondy said.

BSC provides many ways to report these instances of sexual misconduct and violence. These reports can be filed online, but they can also be filed via in-person connections.

"On our website, we have a concerned report," Bondy said. "Connecting with Nicole Mikkelsen or I if somebody wanted to come in via face-to-face, phone call, or email. We also work very closely with other departments, so if a student had a concern that would be reported to police, we work very closely with our police and also with our conduct office."

Services and resources are also available for victims of sexual assault, both on campus and around the Bismarck-Mandan community.

What is the **Red** Zone? The **Red** Zone is the beginning period of a new school year when there is an **increased frequency** of social gatherings and **sexual assault rates.**

Campus sexual assault (CSA) makes up the **greatest proportion** (43%) of total on-campus crimes in the United States, resulting in approximately **8** forcible sex offenses per **10,000** students.

Perhaps the most unconventional of the self-care services provided was a Reiki station, in which participants could have their mental and physical energies healed in a way they may have never before considered.

"It is a good way to have a fresh start. It's like a spiritual massage," Master Reiki practitioner Keshia Hoffer said about the practice.

Indeed, this distinctive way of healing the body and soul certainly seemed to have an effect on those open enough to try it. "It was really eye opening how people can see the things going on within you," BSC Sophomore José Zendejas said.

Despite carrying out the process, Hoffer states firmly that she is not the source of change found within the practice of Reiki, merely the conduit.

"The client heals themselves," she said. "They're able to release anything

they've been holding on to."

In a time where the nation's college students are being rocked by an unprecedented mental health crisis, it is important that proper care is taken to ensure wellness in all aspects of students' lives. The campus community can rest assured knowing that BSC is committed to helping students maintain their physical and mental health.

RED CROSS COMES TO BSC BY ALIX DOBLER

Each semester at Bismarck State College brings an opportunity for growth. With the influx of new students and community interest, the need for more seminars, events, and clubs continues to grow.

Recently BSC faculty hosted a meeting, celebrating the growth of enrollment for the college.

"This past fall semester, we reported our largest freshman class in BSC history, with overall enrollment reaching a 10-year high. Our freshman class in Fall 2023 was also the largest freshman class in the North Dakota System." University Anne Seidler, director of admissions and Recruitment at BSC said.

With incoming freshman students emerging every semester, new student-involvement opportunities are highly sought after.

The American Red Cross is a not-for-profit organization that helps shelter, feed and support those in need while teaching life-saving skills to surrounding communities. The organization is entirely dependent on volunteers to help meet its mission, providing several lines of service such as - disaster cycle services, biomedical services, training services, services to the armed

forces and international services.

Executive Director of The American Red Cross in North Wergeland Dakota, Zoe Manstrom, was one of the table hosts during BSC's Winter Survival event last semester. In addition to informing college students on winter safety tips, Manstrom shared a handful of promotional booklets about American Red Cross clubs.

As coined by The Red Cross, the organization's mission is to 'prevent and alleviate human suffering in the face of emergency by mobilizing the power of volunteers and the generosity of donors.'

The American Red Cross also stated that over 25% of all volunteers are youth and young adults. This number differs greatly in the state of North Dakota, with the majority of volunteers being older adults in the age of retirement.

"The bigger challenge for us is that we only have about 38 volunteers in western North Dakota," Manstrom said.

With such low numbers, Manstrom shares an interest in gaining new volunteers through the idea of Red Cross clubs.

"We really need to get more volunteers and having that



energy that we get from students, will just be fantastic, and fun," Manstrom said.


For those involved in a Red Cross club, opportunities to develop new skills while serving the community leave an abundance of possibilities. Activities range from planning blood drives and sharing disaster preparedness education

to providing food and first aid to groups in need. During their time at the Red Cross, club members gain new knowledge from hands-on experience.

In an academic setting, Red Cross clubs mainly focus on student ideas, leaving complete control of the club's activities to club members. "The experience that individual students have depends on

what the Red Cross club wants to do," Manstrom said.

With an academic adviser's approval, students can discuss and carry out club activities scheduling events that fit with their routines. The organization has a list of potential club activities on its website, helping members get started on sharing the Red Cross's mission.

the other side of On Barbenheimer the coin, "Oppenheimer" leads the field this year with thirteen nominations. The momentum is March 10, on Oscar's night.


Barbie herself, also missed starting to build and this may finally be the year director Christopher Nolan takes home a golden statue of his own.

"So making friends was quite easy because I talk not even a word and people already know I'm English," Cobb said. "Word gets around quick, make some good friends on it, especially on the track team. You know, there is Morgan, Eric, Ivar, Justin, Cody."

Cobb was able to meet a lot of new people which opened plenty of friendship opportunities. Since Cobb is not from the United States, he was only able to drive legally for six months. Now that the time is up, he needs to catch rides from friends to events across Bismarck.

"So I have to prove that, you know, this was the right decision [going to BSC]," Cobb said.

Cobb started the year off by heading to the NJCAA Cross Country Nationals and is trying to qualify this year for track.

Bismarck is widely known as the capital of good 'Ol North Dakota. Nowadays it has exploded into a bustling metropolis. It can be easy to get caught up in the 'new,' new shops, new restaurants, new houses, new everything.

However, nestled in a sleepy neighborhood in south Bismarck stands a log cabin style home. This house is particularly unique because within the dwelling is a small thrift store called The Nearly New. "We were the first ones here, selling used clothing, other than thrift stores. It was all consignment." Nordstrom said. "We later got into the name brands. People really appreciate getting the best for less."

Running a business can be a daunting task within itself, but the ladies have an airtight system to beat the odds. Each takes on the task that the other finds monotonous. They say their partnership works because they are the same age and have a deep understanding of what the other needs.

"I do most of the consigning -- she does the pricing," Nordstrom said. "I go through [and] mark things down and straighten things up."

"We understand what goes on in our families, if we have to do something with the kids, we do it. That's a big thing,' Hohimer said.

Self-care is important to the owners as well when they are not busy in the store they take time to do what they enjoy. Mary is fond of playing pickleball these days and spending time with family while Lois likes to bake and spend time with her grandkids.

"Shes the jock," Hohimer said.

The Nearly New incorporated itself into modern times by opening a Facebook page and



bringing on Andresha Minard, who joined the team last year. She started selling inventory through her personal Poshmark page. Prior to her helping at the store, she was a loyal customer for several years.

"They are like family," Minard said. "They are amazing, sweet, kind."

All the women love working at the store and plan on being there for as long as they can. The best part of their days is getting to go through the inventory.

"It's like hidden treasure." Minard said.

Hohimer said she loves interacting with the customers.

"I've met so many nice people and made so many wonderful friends," Hohimer said.

STUDENTS PUT COLLEGE ON HOLD

For most, the completion of post secondary education is a relatively linear four-year journey that ends with caps, gowns and degrees. For some students however, the road to college graduation is long and winding, filled with unexpected twists and turns.

Determined to escape that demographic, Ellison has chosen to put his learning on the backburner, spending this spring semester in the workplace instead of the classroom. Despite this hurdle in his schooling, he is still fully committed to returning to BSC next fall, seeing the next few months as an unfortunate but "I had a lot of concerns as far as what I wanted to do with my life," Chase Stockert said, a former college sophomore, referring to his time at both BSC and later Valley City State University.

Stockert is part of a significant number of college students who struggle with his community through charity work.

"I want to have more meaning in my life. I want to do something that's larger than myself." Stockert said.

America as a whole is currently struggling with both burgeoning financial instability and a rapidly growing youth mental health crisis-two issues that hit particularly close to home for college students. Now more than ever it is clear that there is no single path to post secondary success.

Trace Ellison is one such student. Originally attending Bismarck State College with the intention of transferring to the University of North Dakota and majoring in criminal justice, Ellison has since found himself going down an entirely different path; one that, at least currently, doesn't involve school at all.

"I come from a low income family," he said. "And I really just needed to take a break and figure out what I was going to do financially for college."

Ellison's situation is not uncommon. According to a survey by Cengage Group, sharp spikes in tuition and living costs have resulted in a staggering 68% of college students nationwide struggling to cover the cost of their education.

Stockert is now looking to make up for those lost opportunities, and he is not wasting any time. After spending the fall semester in Valley City, he briefly re-enrolled at BSC in January before withdrawing from college altogether. The sense of self he is searching for, he has decided, cannot be found in a textbook. Instead he plans on finding it in

Students struggling financially will sometimes need to make difficult decisions to sustain their education, even if it means putting their progress on hold. Those struggling internally will need to take the time and steps necessary to protect their mental health and spiritual wellbeing.

Everybody in between will need to figure out what it is they need to do in order to ensure they get their degree. College is a long road, and everybody's journey is going to look a little different.


A Mystic Media Exclusive Interview with World Renowned Photographer

Photography, the art of capturing a physical moment in time, has come in many different forms over the years as technology has progressed. Digital, film and polaroids are a few examples of modern day photographic processes, but back in 1851, when wet plate photography was invented, to be a photographer meant to also be a chemist. Wet Plate photography is a photographic process that uses photosensitive chemicals and controlled light exposure to create images. Currently, there are less than 1500 wet plate photographers in the world.

Shane Balkowitsch, BSC Alumnus, world-renowned wet plate photographer and owner of Nostalgic Glass Wet Plate Studio, resides in Bismarck. Balkowitsch has photographed a variety of high profile clients, including Greta Thunburg, Josh Duhamel and Shailene Woodley among others. However, Balkowitsch's true passion in wet plate photography is capturing the lives of Native Americans. Currently Balkowitsch is working on a personal project of photographing 1000 Native Americans, to preserve their stories and moments of this life on a piece of glass.

Kaia Lehman of The Mystician recently sat down with Balkowitsch for an exclusive hour-long interview, discussing a variety of topics, such as photography, finding your passion, bowler hats, and much more.

Q: How do you meet your clients?

A: It's all word of mouth. It's always been word of mouth. Wow. So I've never advertised it. Just I make one plate at a time, and I've shared it on Facebook and social media. I've had people come in from all over the world to have their portraits taken as far as New Zealand.



Q: What's up with the hats?

A: Good question. You can go back to Facebook, probably my first year making wet plates, and for whatever reason, I had this \$3 felt Halloween prop hat bowler hat. It was brown...it wasn't even

really, in terms of hats, called a hat other than it looked like a hat.

But it wasn't a hat that you would ever wear outside or you never present yourself with. Someone took a picture of me with this silly bowler hat on and I posted it. And then the following week someone said to me, Well? Where's your hat? So then I said, Well, \$#!?. Okay, I'll put the hat on. So every week I started taking a picture of me and with this cheap ass bowler hat, and then it just kind of stuck...so my wife decided, Well, you can't be, you look like an idiot wearing a \$3 hat around for all your wet plate shoots.

So she went and had a gray felt bowler hat made for me as a Christmas present. And I started wearing that and then it really kind of took off and so that's how the bowler hat became the logo for my studio. And any time that I'm taking an important picture or something, I just have my bowler hat on. Or if I'm doing a podcast, I put a bowler hat somewhere behind me just so there's one always in the frame.



Q: What is your most influential piece?

A: My life's work is my Native American work called Northern Plains, Native Americans from Modern Wet Plate Perspective, because you just never really know what tribes are going to come in. You don't know what regalia they're going to bring or the

heritage that comes in with each one of these people, which is rather fascinating. I'm always learning. I'm always trying to listen and ask questions and continue to learn about my Native American friends.

Q: Why did you decide to go in headfirst?

A: Because I was killing myself at my job. The stress of being the CEO of my online company was killing me... It was physically killing me. Like, I don't think that I could have done it much longer. I would have had to do something in my life to have changed what I was doing, the trajectory of my life. So (wet plate photography) was a creative outlet. And as soon as I found it, it was like, Wow, there's something else here to do.

And once I found that out from this relief so I could I could I could give credit to what pleading for me, surviving the last ten years of my, you know, company. Because it gave me something else to focus on and I don't have to just worry a b o u t business. And it's been ful reme.



Q: How many plates do you plan on making?

"For **today**? **Probably** around 4 to 6. For my life? Until I expire."

Q: Why do you do what you do?

A: you're capturing moments in time that can never be recreated again. if you sat in my chair and I took your wet plate, um, and then I broke it or something, ten or 15 minutes later, you'd still be in the studio, you'd still be wearing the same clothes and still have the same camera, the same chemistry, the same light from that day, and that we could sit you down in that chair again, but we can't give it to you. 18 minutes ago, that's already gone.

So all these photographs, all these plates on the wall, These are 10 seconds of people's lives. That's the only thing I think about in this process is how romantic and beautiful it is. These are ten-second movies. They're still like movies of all these people. So there's a little bit of life in every one of the images.

You don't have that opportunity when you're grabbing your iPhone out or your digital camera out and taking a photograph and 1/60 of a second. It's just such a fraction of your life. You could argue that it's no part of my life. But when you're sitting for a ten-second exposure, there's 10 seconds of your life in a picture.

Q: What's your favorite piece that Q: How did you get you've ever done?

A: I think my masterpiece is my portrait of my wife ... So my wife's favorite statue at the Louvre is Winged Victory...I walked up the steps and saw Winged Victory and it's a headless statue and she's got no arms. And it's just grandiose in so many aspects. And it was my wife's favorite piece. So I talked to Laney Pope, my prop masters for my studio, and she made a garment with the wings to look like a statue.

I put a black bag over my wife's head to remove her head from the exposure. But she has a curvature in her back so the wings are rather heavy and hurting her... So we had Lany make a strap to hold the wings up as she stood there and that's why I like that one.

Obviously my beautiful wife is in it, Bonnie, but also it would have been much easier for Laney to design this outfit and put it on a dress form. Then I wouldn't have to worry about it moving and I could have rotated it and I could have taken many plates of it if I wanted to and get the perfect shot. but that wasn't the point. The point was to actually have my wife holding the door at the outfit up and actually technically to remove her head from that picture. So I think for me personally, that's my masterpiece.

Q: What is wet plate photography?

A: It's a photographic process that was invented in 1851 by Frederick Scott Archer. It's pretty much the second photographic process known to man. I'm an ambrotypist, which means immortal impression. I'm more specifically a black glass ambrotypist, which means I shoot everything on glass ... Many people know the word tin type, and this is the same process. They are just putting their photographs on a piece of metal instead of glass.

into this?

A: I saw a photograph online. This was back in September 2012. It was a photograph of a motorcycle on a blog post by Paul Delores. So I asked him, What is that? He said, it's a wet plate. And then I just fell in love with this somehow. I don't know why.

I keep thinking back to the moment ... If I would have looked away from the screen or if anything else would have caught my attention in the morning ... I never would have chased this process.

So Paul explained to me what it was, and I did some research. I said, 'Well, I would love to do that'. And Paul, a very nice gentleman, said, 'Well, Shane, I've been a photographer some decades now, and I find this very difficult. There's no way a non-photographer will ever teach themselves wet plate. And within about 45 days of that conversation, I'd made my first plate on Oct. 4, 2012.

PIERCING FOR A PURPOSE

Jay Diaz tells all in an exclusive interview

Jay Diaz has been on a journey which ended with him here in Bismarck. He originally grew up in a small town in California where his interests weren't really accepted. He said he loves cats and the cold and considers himself to be fairly introverted. He has been piercing for over a decade now. He works at Alchemist Tattoo & Body Piercing, a popular local tattoo and piercing shop located on Broadway.

In 2010, Diaz got his opportunity to become a piercer while living in California. He became an apprentice at a studio and his mentor at the time is still one of his closest friends to this day. He and the owner of that studio didn't get along, which is why he ended up leaving. Diaz moved to Washington from California.

"I was living in the Bay Area in California and everything was just so expensive," Diaz said. "I couldn't really afford to have a life. It sucked."

He loves gloomy, cold and rainy weather, so he thought Seattle was perfect for him.

"I would live with it every single day if possible," he said.

He ended up not having the greatest experience in Washington either. He met some people that gave him what seemed like a great opportunity, but that was far from the truth.

"Basically managing a studio for almost no pay at all," Diaz said. "I was never allowed to studio, and she and I became instant best friends."

Unfortunately, it didn't work out too well in Oregon. After about a year of Diaz working at the shop with Fritz, Fritz was betrayed by the owner. This resulted in her moving back home to Bismarck to work at what is now Alchemist. This presented another opportunity for Diaz.


"She told me, 'as soon as I'm ready, I will call you, and you will come work for me," he said. "I was like, nah, North Dakota. I'm never moving to North Dakota."

He stayed in Oregon for a couple of years. It was perfect weather for him and he had a great friend group. During those couple of years in Oregon, he would come to Bismarck to guest spot at Alchemist and hang out with the members of the studio. Fritz offered a job to him one more time the summer of 2022.

"I was just fed up and I was like, you know what? I'm ready for something new. Let's give it a try," Diaz said. "I came up for a wedding, and at that wedding the other two owners told me that they really wanted me to move out here, too."

He took this as his sign and moved to Bismarck in October of 2022. He ended up enjoying North Dakota more than he thought he would.

Meeting and talking to piercers on discussion forums is what made him realize that it is something he could make a living off-that there is a whole community of people with the same interest.

"She was like, 'you deserve better. Come to Oregon, spend a couple days with me. Just hang out at the studio, see what you could potentially have. See if it's different. See if it's better," Diaz said. "So I went down and instantly fell in love with ... the matter that there's not a whole to do here. I've got the most incredible family/friend

group at the shop that is just unparalleled."

Diaz enjoys the confidence that piercing and body modification gives a person. Through his own experience with body modification, he's been more confident in himself and more comfortable in his own skin.

"Once I pierce them, and they get up and look in that mirror, you see their face just glow," he said. "Like it can totally change a person-it can also make somebody, you know, who

pretty stuck up about it, meet me or meet someone at our studio, they realize, wow, this is not scary. This is the exact opposite of what we thought."

Diaz enjoys doing all different kinds of piercings. Ultimately, for him it comes down to the jewelry that the client picks.

"There's times where even earlobes can be the best piercing, and they'll do something super cool or use some unique jewelry," he said. "You know, people think it's so basic to get earlobes pierced and everyone does it but there's still a lot that goes into it."

As for himself, his vertical philtrum is his favorite piercing. It's an uncommon, unique piercing that isn't seen very often.

For tattoos he has some that are meaningful to him. He has his whole left leg done by Simeon, one of the tattoo artists/owners at Alchemist.

"It means so much to me because it's how I met him and really was introduced to Alchemist," Diaz said. His trifecta of cats hand tattoo also means a lot to him. He said it felt like an "in" to the body modification world.


"I got it as soon as I finished my apprenticeship and knew I was gonna be able to make it in this industry because you don't tattoo your hands, right?" he said.




The other tattoo is on his palm, which from an outsider's eye seems like a math equation, but it's much more than that.

"It's [tattoo] from a book that changed the way I think about a lot of things and changed me in a way that I did not imagine would have happened from reading it," Diaz said. As for Diaz's future, for him, he's satisfied with the point he's at. He said he enjoys working at his studio and the crew he works with. MYSTICS PREPARE FOR UPCOMING SEASON

Coach Jaden Scott shares insights on the team.

The Bismarck State College baseball team is swinging back into action. Head Coach Jaden Scott and the Mystics will begin conference play against the reigning Mon-Dak Conference Champions, Miles Community College, on Saturday, March 23.

"It's a good task for us to go see Miles and figure out where we stand right away," Scott said. BSC is returning just 11 of the 22 freshmen from last year's 30-win team, which means Scott and his staff had a busy offseason with recruiting. There are 18 new faces joining the program and only six are from North Dakota. During the process, Scott says they looked for pitchers that were throwing with good velocity and were controlling the strike zone with their off-speed pitches.

"We got some really high character individuals this year that I'm excited to work with," Scott said. "On the mound, I think we're going to throw it really well this year and that comes with a handful of freshmen guys that jump out. Mason Lunzman, Matthew Porter and Tristan Delaplante have all been really good for us."

As for offense, Scott said

freshmen Nixon Carriere is a big addition to the team and has been swinging the bat very well.

"[We're] excited to get [Carriere] some opportunities in the lineup and see what he does with those," Scott said. "We've thrown him in at a couple different positions [and] he's jumped right in full stride."

With so many first-year athletes, Scott is looking for his sophomore competitors to be a resource for the younger guys to lean on. He mentioned catcher Wyatt Tweet and 2023 Mon-Dak All-Conference pitcher Kyle Odenbach as two sophomores that have done a good job leading the way so far.

"Obviously they've been here for a year playing college baseball," freshman pitcher Mason Lunzman said. "They know a little bit more of what's going on and [how] to handle adversity, so we take what they say and really take it into account."

McCoy Keller, another freshman pitcher, said the sophomores know what to expect with every practice. We just look after what they do and how they do it and try to recreate as best as we can, he added.

Coach Scott and the baseball program have two recurring goals for every season. They want to make their athletes better and help find them their second home after BSC at the four-year level. Along with those goals, Scott hopes this team can win the 2024 regional title.

"By a lot of numbers we had a super successful season last year," Scott said. "The one spot we fell short was the region tournament, so [we're] hoping to go out, make amends, and take that region title home."

The Mystics have a lot of position depth this year, which is something the team struggled with last season. Scott says their depth will be one of the many strengths this team has in 2024. He also added that the depth has him excited for a couple of legit position battles.

"We feel comfortable with a lot of different guys out there," Scott said. "I think that's a huge part of having success in baseball."

BEST IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST SEEK CHAMPIONSHIP New Mexico Lobos stands out of the pack

The New Mexico Lobos currently sit at the top of the Mountain West basketball conference.

The Lobos have an overall record of 20-5 and a conference record of 8-4. In years past, an 8-4 record in the Mountain West would not be noteworthy, but this conference that began in 1990 is having its best season ever.

two conferences to have at least five teams inside the top 35 NCAA Evaluation Tool rankings. The NET ranking system is used to categorize the quality of wins and losses based on opponent rank and game location. The tool is specifically used to help the NCAA Tournament committee members choose which teams make the tournament.

I expect the depth and play style of New Mexico to carry them to the second weekend in the NCAA Tournament. In his third year as head coach, Richard Pitino, son of the prominent Hall of Famer Rick Pitino, has found success through his passionate and dynamic coaching approach. Pitino's team follows his coaching style with the way they play intense and creative offense.

The Mountain West is one of New Mexico has no problem scoring the ball as they rank tenth in the country in points per game. They are quick to get up shots and make an average of 31 field goals per game, the sixth most among division-one teams.

> The Lobos' offense is led by a trio of experienced guards. Jaelen House, Jamal Mashburn Jr. and Donovan Dent each average over 15 points per game.

> Teams with balanced offensive production have been having the most success in tournaments. When you look back at the last three national champions, UConn, Kansas and Baylor, all three were full of talented scorers at every level. A team like New Mexico does not have to rely on one player for the offensive production and to have three scoring

guards is a huge advantage in a tournament setting.

The guards are not the only position that excites me about the Lobos. JT Toppin is a 6-foot-9 freshman forward with exuberant athleticism.

Along with his 12.4 points per game average, Toppin leads the team in rebounds snatching over eight a game. He adds a fourth scoring threat to New Mexico's offense. The freshman earns second-chance opportunities for his team with his talented offensive rebounding ability. Toppin ranks 22nd in the nation with an average of 3.44 offensive rebounds a game.

New Mexico's high-powered offense is created through their defense. The team averages over 16 fastbreak points a game which is fifth most in the country. Pitino has his guards play with active hands and relentless defensive pressure on most opponent possessions.

House leads the defense with nearly three steals a game and was recently named to the Naismith Defensive Player of the Year Watch List. While House is defending the perimeter, Toppin protects the rim with an average of two blocks a game.

The balanced scoring, led by a trio of skillful guards and complemented by the elite athleticism of Toppin, alongside the unrelenting defense, poses a tiring challenge for opponents.

The Lobos are going to be a team to watch out for as they aim for a deep tournament run at the end of March. It would be no shock if the Lobos find themselves competing for a spot in the Final Four.




