

THEY BUILD HOUSES: BSC CARPENTRY STUDENTS TAKE PART IN LARGE UNDERTAKINGS

Along Silver Boulevard, the air rings with the sound of electric tools whirring tirelessly in construction. Workers stand upon and around large construction projects installing roofs and walls. In front of one particular house sits a trailer that reads "Bismarck State College Carpentry."

BSC's polytechnic mission involves various levels of hands-on training and experience. For each department under that umbrella, the degree for which they will be trained and in what manner varies widely. For the carpentry department, this means that their two semester long training involves constructing an entire house that people can live in.

"Each student has put in at least one window, each student has put in at least one door, each student has put in at least one wall," Trenton Zainhofsky, carpentry class president, said.

The draw of carpentry varies from student to student. Zainhofsky's father owns a construction business, and he wanted to learn more. Another large draw is the ability to make a living working outside and doing physical labor.

"I used to do concrete; I did that for a few years, so I got to understand the very beginning parts of building a house," Jeremy

Wodworth, a carpentry student, said. "I always wondered what exactly it would look like after that process."

There are more parts to the carpentry program outside of

windows, doors and walls. In February 2021, the students got to display their personal work projects in a showcase in the Student Union. The pieces on display included tables, chests,

benches and exquisite coat racks.

Another part of home building the

students took part in was creating the cabinets in the kitchen areas. On site, students worked in varying degrees to install wood flooring and the closet of the master bedroom.

The work days are exactly that, work days. Students work on the house from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. with an hour

break for lunch. In simulating a real work day, the students spend their time learning the ins and outs of the process in all they craft and build for one undertaking.

"I had a couple years of experience and a couple houses that I built previously, so I knew a fair amount coming into the process," Zainhofsky said. "Of course there's always more you can learn."

Carpentry students at BSC can earn a diploma, certificate or a degree in

In 1970, Bismarck State College introduced the Lineworker Electrical program, and 50 years later, it is still going strong. They are doing so well that, with a grant from North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives, BSC is building a new training center and has waiting lists for students who are eager to be a part of the program.

During those past 50 years, BSC has also added several different energy programs, including Lineworkers, Mechanical Maintenance, Nuclear Power and Wastewater Technology.

These four programs are managed by Process Plant Technology Lecturer Kyren Miller who is a department chair for the NECE and energy programs. He also teaches the oneyear lineworker program courses.

"We call it the three-semester program," Miller said. "In the first summer semester, they take two courses that are required. Intro to climbing, where we provide them the equipment to climb, and the teachers teach them how to wear their gear. They start with climbing to a 6 foot mark, then a 15 foot mark and then 32 feet while they also get comfortable wearing their gear."

During the summer semester, the lineworker students are taught basic equipment operations, including how to run a skid steer, a digger derrick truck and backhoe.

After completing those courses, the

students are given a short break until August when the rest of BSC students return for the fall semester, they return to start the core lineworker courses.

"The fall semester is all about learning how to work with

their equipment and putting up lines," Miller said. "Then when we come back from the holiday break, they are going to do more advanced construction and underground line splice, running trenchers and things like that."

While some students do stick around to finish five more general

education courses to get a two-year associate's degree, more than half of the students who are enrolled in the program, go on to be lineworkers right after graduation. And graduation includes a rodeo.

"We've been doing it for a few years now, we do what they call a lineman rodeo," Miller said.

"It's just a number of events where

the students draft their teammates to do five different activities that they have to do, and the parents get to come and watch. They do these different skill sets, and we grade them on safety and procedure, time and quickness. Then we award them prizes that are donated

by some of the vendors. What better way for the parents to see where their money is going towards."

To help celebrate the 50 years of the program, the NDAREC awarded a grant to construct a new building for the BSC Lineworker Electrical program. This new building is a \$6 million project and will be a brand new training center, with two classrooms, a truck simulator room and an indoor climbing arena.

Construction will begin this summer, with the new training center being completed by July 2022.

"We're also doing a ceremony ahead of the lineman rodeo on May 6th," Miller said. "Hopefully a few Senators will be there and Kelly Armstrong, and either the governor will speak or the mayor of Mandan, to do a dedication for the new training center. Along with a few people who were a big part in making the grant happen, we will have them speak for a bit."

Miller was also able to go through some old pictures and locate a gentleman from the first class in 1970, who will also be there to celebrate.

BSC is the only school in the state that offers a Lineworker program, and has put out a large number of graduates who have found careers.

"We're pretty excited," Miller said.
"Not a lot of programs can say they've made it 50 years successfully. We've got some great faculty members that have taken the program up a notch."

BSC LAUNCHES SONOGRAPHY PROGRAM WITH INDUSTRY AND GRANT SUPPORT

Responding to an increasing demand for sonographers across the state, Bismarck State College has launched a Diagnostic Medical Sonography program to train students for the high-wage, high-skill career. According to Job Service North Dakota predictions, the need for sonographers in the state will increase nearly 26 percent from 2019-2029, equating to more than 200 positions.

The foundational support for the new program came from Sanford Health, which provided the first commitment of support for the Sonography program director position.

Sanford Health established a scholarship endowment fund at the BSC Foundation to support students entering Health Science programs at BSC. In addition, both BSC and the BSC Foundation were awarded three grants totaling \$290K to purchase

equipment and supplies to start the new Sonography program.

The Otto Bremer Trust awarded the BSC Foundation \$80K to purchase ultrasound machines for student

BSC received \$50K from the ND Career and Technical Education Perkins Innovation Grant and \$160K from the ND Governor's Emergency Educational Relief Fund.

Together, these grant funds allowed the purchase of enough ultrasound machines and simulators to ensure all students receive hands-on training on the same high-tech equipment they'll be using in the workforce.

Enrollment in the sonography program is strong, with 35 students enrolled in pre-Sonography courses, ready to begin their technical courses in Fall 2021.

BSC ENROLLMENT NUMBERS AND STATISTICS

As we hit the middle of the spring term for most colleges, enrollment is continuing a downward trend nationwide. Overall undergraduate enrollment is down 4.5 percent compared to last spring, according to data from The National Student Clearinghouse Research Center.

Below is a look at new students admitted to DSU in the last four years. (The 2021 figure, last updated February 28, is not final).

2018: 299 2019: 300 2020: 340 2021: 317

Across the U.S. it's the community colleges that have been the hardest hit by COVID-19, with enrollment numbers down almost 9.5 percent from last spring.

Here, Bismarck State College saw a small decrease from spring 2020 to spring 2021, at 1.64 percent. BSC did see a large growth in several majors, including nursing and cybersecurity.

- · Practical Nursing up 22 percent
- · Medical Laboratory Technician up 23 percent
- · Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) up 64 percent
- · Cybersecurity AAS up 66 percent · Cybersecurity BAS up 13 percent
- Dickinson State will have a better idea of final fall enrollment numbers at the end of April when students begin to register for classes. President Easton attributes the spring growth to new athletic programs, adding a master's program, and bringing in

students from Dickinson High School

to take some college classes early.

Graduate school enrollment is a completely different story. In fact, it's growing more with each passing semester, up by 4.3 percent this spring. Interestingly, advanced healthcare degrees are rising in popularity right now, especially respiratory therapy.

Bismarck State College is providing students with unique opportunities that give hands-on

learning experiences.

Specially-created programs offer majors within several career areas: Cybersecurity, Agriculture, Business and Law, Communications, STEM, Transportation and Construction, Energy and Health Sciences. Under these areas are over 40 different programs for students to choose from. These programs will help students through work-learn opportunities such as internships, professional practice and field experience that will

be useful when they leave school.

"I like the move of us going to four years," BSC Athletic Coordinator Thai Haggin said. "It does a lot for the college; it says a lot for us. We're making gains; we're making moves and as far as the athletic department; we've got to make those movements too. What does it look like? Not sure yet, but when the time comes we'll have to do more digging; we'll have to

do more studying about it, making sure we're going that way, too."

Haggin said that with more four-year programs, students could stay longer. Moving BSC toward a polytechnic school will make the school a fouryear junior college.

"As far as athletics go, we have been

exploring going the four-year route," BSC Director of Athletics Buster Gilliss said.


Gillis said he's had meetings with the commissioner of the North Star conference of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA),

The whole purpose was to not only say to always keep your options open as you never know what can happen, especially in college. Also,



REAL-LIFE SIMULATION:

We're all given one life to live. Throughout this life it seems that we are searching for who we are and who we want to be. If we're lucky we can find our identity, and in some cases we can have several.

On this day, the identity is Janice. Janice is a female in her sixties presenting to the ER and will be transferred to the Intensive Care Unit (ICU). She's lucky enough to have many nursing hopefuls looking after her and caring for her, trying to figure out what may be the main issue.

Janice has gone through many identities in just a week span, because she is a simulator.

At Bismarck State College, there are 38 nursing students studying to be Registered Nurses (RN). While studying, nursing students are put through the wringer when it comes to medical issues and studies. The use of simulators in the program help prepare the students for real life experiences they may encounter in the

workforce. Wednesdays are typically a simulation day for the students.

Janice is as close to a human patient as they can get: being able to breathe, blink, have IVs inserted and medications given. She is able to talk and interact with students with the help of a speaker run by an instructor behind the scenes. She can also have

her movements changed by the use of a computer. There are also other simulators that can be used such as a pediatric patient and a maternity patient who can deliver a baby.

But on this particular Wednesday, the focus was all on Janice.

It all starts as a typical shift would on a hospital floor. The students are in groups of three to four and given roles such as RNs, Certified Nursing Assistants (CNA), Licensed Practical Nurses (LPN) and an observer. Report is given from the head nurse about Janice's symptoms and current status. There are tasks given and steps that need to be completed.

"All of us nurses are CSI," said Kay Rodgers, BSC Assistant Professor of Nursing, MSN, BSN, RN.

Once report is finished, it's off to the races.

When the students are finished with

Janice, they are able to discuss with the instructors about how they felt, things that were done well and things that could be improved.

"We do our best to mimic what is learned in class to apply that to the

simulation," Rodgers said.

Just when you thought it couldn't get more real than that, Fridays come around.

Friday simulations are the icing on the cake, the full Monty and the cream of the crop. There isn't just one simulation on this day but rather several all happening at once--a full hospital simulation. Students are really put to the test with emergency room and floor patients. More roles are added such as doctors, managers and house supervisors in which the students are to call with any questions and things that may be needed.

Several people are also in the ER waiting room seeking care, while others are waiting for a bed placement after a separate patient is discharged.

"So they have to triage the patients and decide who's the priority care," said Carmen Bryhn, BSC Clinical Nursing Instructor, MSN, BSN, RN.

"That's what we do on Fridays, so they have a whole floor to take care of as well as an ER to really figure out their priorities and their meds," Bryhn said.

Besides simulators, people are put into certain roles to make everything as real as possible. Select students are given roles such as patients, concerned family members and observers. There are characters such as someone seeking mental health services, a concerned mother looking for care for her 3 month old child, family

looking after their elderly mother and a wife wondering why her husband is having chest pain. These individuals are encouraged to really play up those roles and to seek out information to make the experience more genuine. It goes to show that the students aren't only dealing with all of the needs of the patients, but the needs of the families as well.

"It's real life because, you know, your patients are all going to need something at once," Bryhn said.

If the stress and adrenaline of that wasn't enough, a code blue was called on one of the simulator patients, and CPR had to be administered. Once the code blue is recognized, those playing doctors, nurses, LPNs, managers and anyone else who is readily available run to the scene and CPR compressions are started immediately. The room is filled with anyone trying to help and to keep the patient's wife calm. While CPR is still ongoing, they are able to know if chest compressions are being done correctly and if the patient is recovering via the simulation computer. After several minutes of CPR, defibrillating shocks and medications given, the patient woke up and all was clear in that moment. Despite that high-stress situation, things remained calm, and everything was taken care of with a good outcome in the end.

After everything and everyone has been taken care of, the students and facilitators gather in a classroom to discuss the event. Asking how the students felt was the first topic brought up.

"I learned a lot," said a student sitting within the group.

"It's cool to see the different groups and different dynamics," another student added.

"Calm, organized chaos," Anna Anderson, BSC Assistant Professor of Nursing, MSN, RN, CNE, said.

Student observers give information on what they saw and things that can be worked on. Those who played the roles of patients and family also give insight to what they experience and how they felt afterwards. As more discussions go on, a sense of relief and accomplishment can be seen within the group as they chat.

Simulations like these will help prepare the students for not only a nursing environment, but with passing boards as well. The National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN) is what the students will take to assess their knowledge and skills to become a licensed RN

"You're only a student for so long. I know it seems like forever, but you're only a student for so long," Anderson said. Even while living in a fast-paced world, much like a hospital floor, it can be hard to imagine everything a nurse may have to go through on a daily basis. This training goes to show that nurses are a vital part of our healthcare system.







STATE FAIR BRINGS BACK LIVE MUSIC

The year 2020 was trying for everyone. Fear reigned supreme as no one knew what would happen next. Self isolation, masks and face coverings, businesses closing and special events being put on hold for the foreseeable future. The question on everyone's mind; when will we go back to normal? While that answer remains a mystery, it seems there's a light at the end of the tunnel for the return of normalcy. Businesses are re-opening, fans can go watch their sports teams.

And concerts are coming back. The Red River Valley Fair is back and bigger than ever. The fair had to cancel plans due to the pandemic last year, but this year they won't be stopped. "We plan on having a normal fair," Red River Valley Fair General Manager Cody Cashman said.

Cashman talked about steps the fair is taking to stay safe

"What we're gonna try to ask people to do is get vaccinated" said Cashman. "We're not gonna require that at all, but what's lucky now is they just came out with a report that half of the nation's adults are vaccinated, and that's who's coming to the fair ... adults for the concert part of it."

This year's Red River Valley Fair will put on eight concerts along with monster trucks and race events. This year's lineup includes: Skillet, Chris Young, Styx, Ratt, Tom Keifer from Cinderella, Kix and Trace Adkins along with three unannounced concerts that will be free for the public.

"We're pretty fortunate," said Cashman. "We're gonna be one of the ones out there that actually gets to have a concert this year."

Cashman did not disclose any information about the unannounced acts

With the global pandemic still lingering, most would think bands would not be ready to pull the trigger on playing live shows again, which would make concert booking very difficult. In the case for the Red River Valley Fair, COVID-19 actually helped with booking.

Cashman said they had kind of a good problem with booking bands. Cashman said people knew that North Dakota would not have the struggle that everyone else has to be open and have events because of the state's population density and low covid numbers. "Most talent agents saw that and they saw it as an opportunity."

Sadly, in this day in age, not everyone is ready to go back to

normal. There are still those who are not ready to return to a maskless society yet. There are also those who choose to criticise others for trying to go back to normal in the midst of the pandemic. Cashman understands there are people who will not like this and that there are people who may be uncomfortable with the thought of being at a non-socially distanced show

"If you don't feel safe coming to the fairgrounds, don't come" Cashman said.

Bands have tried virtual concerts within the past year, but they don't have the same feeling as being in the presence of the band. 2020 has taken away the excitement of seeing live music, but now the light at the end of the tunnel grows closer. Now the excitement can come back.

SUPER SMASH BROS DIVIDING ITSELF FOR DECADES

Smash Bros. games are not the typical fighting game from the 20th century. The goal is to deal damage to one's enemy and then knock them off the stage, thus taking one of their lives.

Although each game has the same goal of defeating one's opponent, the games are different, each having developed its own unique, deep and intriguing meta-game.

Smash 64 places emphasis on first hits and combo execution. In Super Smash Bros 64, the pace is somewhere in the middle of the other games. Characters are slower, but because of multiple long combos, the matches are not long. Edge-guarding is an important factor since most of the characters have poor recoveries and are usually limited to one option as a result of not having a side special or air-dodge. Air-dodging grants the player's character invincibility for a brief period of time while airborne and does not exist in SSB64. Side-stepping does not exist in SSB64. This means that a player's options for combating a grab are move away, pivot, attack or

Super Smash Bros Ultimate is the

most current installment in the smash series. It is frequently updated with bug fixes and currently has over 80 playable characters.

Melee matches are the fastest out of the series. Players are vulnerable when off the stage, thus edge-guarding is a valuable skill to master. Air-dodging grants the player invulnerability and stops the character's momentum. This makes them go into a helpless fall state afterwards, which creates a high risk, high reward system. Side-stepping is usually only used to directly counter a grapple. Any use of it in other situations will often result in a harsh punishment.

Brawl matches are slow-paced compared to the other titles. As in previous titles, players are still at a disadvantage when attempting to recover because of edge-guarding. Players can air-dodge as many times as they like with minimal lag in between, but players can not directionally air-dodge. Most characters' out of shield options were weakened or removed entirely for Brawl. Side-stepping became more commonly used because of this.

"I personally think Ultimate is my favorite because of the roster music and the mechanic fixes they did," Gamer Brian Roehm said. "Shulk is a huge example with his mode swapping. Smash Ultimate doesn't bring out just some characters in the spotlight, it gives all of the characters a chance to shine."

Smash Ultimate shows match

speeds ranging from lightning fast to a turtle-like standoff.

Because of many characters' recoveries improving and the ability for multiple players to grab the ledge in Ultimate, edge-guarding does not have the advantage it has had in previous titles. Directional airdodge returns in Ultimate, albeit slightly altered. Although it will put the character into a free fall, the player still has the option to do a neutral air-dodge and not enter free fall afterwards. A player air-dodging will also receive a small amount of lag, leaving them open for an assault. Side-stepping and rolling are more important than in previous titles. Most characters have frame data on their roll that is equal to or better than the best rolls from the other games. Repeated dodge-rolling will incur lag.

"Ultimate is my favorite by a long shot. I find the gameplay much

more enjoyable. When people play Smash Ultimate, it's for sure a fasterpaced game than ever before in the franchise," Vice President of Gamer's Club Jackson Hellman said.

Although each community has its differences, they all end up loving the same franchise. SSB64 has a unique combo and poke system, Melee provides more action-packed gameplay in terms of mechanical depth and game-speed, and Brawl is a slower-paced game overall compared to the others. To be one's best in a competitive game is always the goal, but players must not forget that at the end of the day, Smash is a game that brings friends together and is meant to be enjoyed in a fun environment that feels rewarding whichever way one chooses to play it.

HOW CORONAVIRUS HAS AFFECTED THE CINEMA WORLD

There was a time when one could just pull up to a movie theatre at midnight after a long day of work as a way of unwinding and enjoy a movie —a time when hundreds would flock to the theatres bumping each other on the line to watch a movie premiere- a time before COVID-19.

When the dreaded virus struck the country for the first time in the beginning of 2020, people thought it would be a slight issue sorted out in a few days, but unfortunately for them, months later, they found themselves cooped up in the house for hours on end without a chance to go to the movies to enjoy their favorite films.

Not only the movie-goers felt this negative shift but also the film industry itself. 2020 was a horrible year for Hollywood and the whole world when it came to entertainment. Globally, the entertainment sector lost a total of \$2.1 billion, losing 5.6 percent of its total revenue in 2020 alone.

Since China was the first country to be affected by COVID-19, Clark Travis

of the Business Insider said that they had already lost \$2.1 billion by March 2020. This effect, according to the PricewaterhouseCoopers, will take until post 2024 for the global revenues to be recovered.

Though Hollywood felt the pain where it hurts most, their pockets, not all hope was lost. When the \$900 billion stimulus relief plan was signed by Congress, a SAVE OUR STAGES ACT was put in place within the relief, which aided 70 percent of mid-sized and smaller movie theatres to avoid full bankruptcy or even being closed permanently. This Act proved helpful since it saved 70,000 jobs according to the National Association of Theatre Owners. Big corporate theatres such as AMC theatres were unfortunate to not receive the financial aid like the rest. Cineworld, America's second largest cinema chain closed its theatres in October 2020.

COVID-19 has claimed many lives and forced many businesses closed, but the film industry is trying a comeback during the pandemic by letting some productions go back to shooting.

The "Jurassic world: Dominion"

crew was one of the first ones to be given the thumbs up to continue filming last year in England.

Production was different, with social distancing policies in effect for everyone on set and an announcement over the amplifier every five hours to remind everyone to change their masks for new ones.

WHY I WATCHED A SIX-HOUR REVIEW ON A 90S' JAPANESE DATING SIMULATOR

William Timothy Rogers Jr. is a quite lauded name in video game circles. He wrote some of the most formative reviews for future video game journalists and developed one of the best simple Esports games out there, "Videoball." One of his largest claims to fame that he will reference to this day is the creation of ActionButton.net, a website hosting his and others various

reviews on video games, including the "ActionButton.net Manifesto."

In 2020, Rogers would bring Action Button back as a YouTube channel, creating video essays on recent and old games that tend to be on the three hour side. With all of his emphatic words and well edited comedy bits, he takes a kind and offbeat approach to looking at his review subjects. Surgical precision is applied to each subject, leaving no stone unturned and no related article unread.

On New Years Day 2021, Rogers posted a video on the Konami dating simulator, "Tokimeki Memorial." That video is six hours long.

Like the madman I am, I watched the entirety in one day while sick in early April and again in mid April to make sure all the details were correct. In short, the headline is a lie, I spent 13 hours watching a review about a Japanese dating simulator.

What can seem like a substantial time sink was well worth it in the end. Rogers has a way with talking about a game that borders on arcane. The web he weaves of his experience inside and out of the game is paced in such ways that no matter how exhausted and sick you are, you cannot look away. Exploring the story of "Tokimeki Memorial" can suddenly take a much needed detour into Rogers' own love life and intimate moments at White Castle. The way he says the full title of everything cited like a bibliography has a degree of charm and academic earnestness that makes the experience seem less of a waste and bears more resemblance towards reading an academic work.

If that does not sound like a fun time, congratulations, then it is not and should be avoided by you at all costs. But if you would like to sit down at various moments over the next month to explore what it takes to woo fictional character, Shiori Fujisaki, then Action Button is for you.
