hat is the best part about Christmas Break, besides the fantastic christmas dinner? Being able to binge watch Netflix. With Netflix having over 1,000 TV shows, it could make the decision a little difficult. After careful consideration, here is a list of the best shows to binge watch over break.

Shameless (American version)Shameless is about a dysfunctional
family. Frank Gallagher, a single father
of six who spends much of his free time
drinking at bars. The Gallagher children
-- led by eldest daughter Fiona (Emmy
Rossum), who takes on much of the
child-rearing responsibility due to her
mother's absence. The drama is an
adaptation of the BAFTA Award-winning
British show of the same name.

Jane the Virgin-Jane Villanueva, the daughter of a teen mother, grew up determined not to repeat her mom's mistakes. Jane is studying to be a teacher. She is engaged to a handsome detective who supports her decision to remain a virgin until marriage, but a routine visit to the clinic turns her life upside down. Inseminated by a specimen meant for a patient in the next room, Jane is in a situation made only more insane when she learns that the sperm donor is her boss, Rafael. As her meticulously planned life gets more like the telenovelas she loves, she faces a lot of complicated decisions about the future.

Grey's Anatomy-The medical drama series focuses on a group of doctors at a hospital in Seattle, including several

Stranger Things- This thrilling
Netflix-original drama stars awardwinning actress Winona Ryder as
Joyce Byers, who lives in a small
Indiana town in 1983. When Joyce's
12-year-old son, Will, goes missing,
she launches a terrifying investigation
into his disappearance with local
authorities. As they search for answers,
they unravel a series of extraordinary
mysteries involving secret government
experiments, unnerving supernatural
forces, and a unusual little girl.

Making a Murder-Exonerated after spending nearly two decades in prison for a crime he did not commit, Steven Avery filed suit against Manitowoc County, Wis. and several individuals involved with his arrest. Shortly after, however, Avery found himself behind bars again, this time accused of the murder of 25-year-old photographer Teresa Halbach. She was last seen on Avery's property, where she was supposed to photograph a vehicle. Avery and nephew Brendan Dassey were tried and (spoiler alert) convicted of the crime. Netflix took on the controversy to produce the 10-episode docuseries, which generated plenty of publicity and prompted petitions to have Avery's case reviewed, though officials in Wisconsin insist all the evidence is not presented in the program.

How to Get Away with Murder-Annalise Keating is a brilliant,

charismatic and seductive professor of defense law who teaches a class called How to Get Away With Murder. Annalise, also a criminal defense attorney, selects a group of students, the best and the brightest, to assist with cases at her firm alongside her employees: the trustworthy and discreet Frank Delfino and Bonnie Winterbottom, an associate attorney. Mysteries arise that test everyone's limits and reveal dark truths.

Scandal- "Grey's Anatomy" creator Shonda Rhimes is the creative mind behind this ABC drama. Olivia Pope, a former media consultant to the president, is ready to move on with her life and opens her own crisismanagement firm, but she can't seem to shake ties with her past. Olivia's staff includes Quinn Perkins, who has a complicated history, and hacker extraordinaire Huck. As she moves forward it becomes clear that, while her staffers may specialize in cleaning up the lives of other people, they can't seem to do the same for themselves.

One Tree Hill- Half brothers Lucas and Nathan trade between kinship and rivalry on the basketball court and in the hearts of their friends in the small town of Tree Hill.

Gossip Girl- Gossip Girl follows the lives of privileged teenagers on the upper east side. Serena Van Der Woodsen is a blonde and beautiful socialite. Blair Waldorf is Serena's best friend but it's always about Serena not Blair. Nate Archibald is Blair's boyfriend



but ever since Serena came back from boarding school, Nate has been acting strange. Chuck Bass a rich and arrogant person. Daniel Humphrey a loney boy from Brooklyn, NY who nobody knows. Follow their lives in this guilty pleasure show.

The Flash- At 11, Barry Allen's life changed completely when his mother died in a freak accident and his innocent father was convicted of her murder. Now a crime scene investigator. his dedication to learn the truth about his mother's death drives him to follow up on every new scientific advancement and urban legend. When his latest obsession, a particle accelerator heralded as a world-changing invention, causes an explosion, it creates a freak storm and Barry is struck by lightning. He awakes from a coma nine months later with the power of superspeed. When he learns that others who have gained powers use them for evil, he dedicates himself to protecting the innocent, while still trying to solve the older mystery.

Daredevil- The first in a planned series of shows detailing the Marvel universe, "Daredevil" follows Matt Murdock, attorney by day and vigilante by night. Blinded in an accident as a child, Murdock uses his heightened senses as Daredevil to fight crime on the streets of New York after the sun goes down. While Murdock's day job requires him to believe in the criminal justice system, his alter ego does not follow suit, leading him to take the law into his own hands to protect his Hell's Kitchen

neighborhood and the surrounding communities.

House of Cards- U.S. Rep. Francis Underwood of South Carolina starts out as a ruthless politician seeking revenge in this Netflix original production. Promised the post of Secretary of State in exchange for his support, his efforts help to ensure the election of Garrett Walker to the presidency. But Walker changes his mind before the inauguration, telling Underwood he's too valuable in Congress. Outwardly, Underwood accepts his marching orders, but secretly he and his wife, an environmental activist, make a pact to destroy Walker and his allies. Based on the U.K. miniseries of the same name. the U.S. version offers a look behind the scenes at the greed and corruption in American politics. A number of real-life media figures make cameo appearances.

Scream- MTV teams with superproducers Bob and Harvey Weinstein on a TV series adaptation of the hit horror film franchise. Instigated by a cyberbullying incident that goes viral, a brutal murder in Lakewood stirs memories of a crime spree from the town's past that has haunted some, intrigued others and maybe just spawned a new executioner.

The Office- This U.S. adaptation, set at a paper company in Scranton, Pa., has a similar documentary style to that of the Ricky Gervais-led British original. It features the Dunder-Mifflin staff, which includes characters based

on roles in the British show and, quite possibly, people with whom you work in your office. There's Jim, the likable employee who's a bit of an every man. Jim has a thing for receptionist-turned-sales-rep Pam, because office romances are always a good idea! There's also Dwight, the co-worker who is successful but devoid of social skills and common sense.

Arrested Development- Michael Bluth finds himself forced to stay in Orange County and run the family real estate business after his father, George Bluth Sr., is sent to prison for committing white-collar crime. He tries to juggle the wants and needs of his spoiled and eccentric family while being a good role model for his teenage son, George Michael.

along the way because it meant she was not far from him. He could feel his excitement growing, for he had been longing to talk to her for ages. There was so much for him to catch her up on.



he cheerful noise of band practice emanates throughout Schafer Hall. The director behind these melodies, John Darling, is a current professor of music at Bismarck State College and the Department Chair of Fine Arts and Humanities.

"I always knew that I was going to do something with music," Darling said. "I always imagined that I was going to be a teacher at some point."

At a young age Darling developed a diverse range of talent in band.

"I started on clarinet – which is pretty basic - it was one of the only choices back then," Darling said. "I switched over to saxophone in my third year of playing. From there I played whatever the band director needed."

After graduating in 1975 from Amherst Regional High School in Massachusetts, Darling enlisted in the United States Army. From there Darling attend several different colleges to attain his degrees.

"While I was in the military trying to complete my bachelor's degree, I was able to take classes in order to complete it through the State of New York Regent Program," Darling said. "I got my Master of Music degree from the Virginia Commonwealth University, and from there I got my doctorate degree from Ohio State University."

For Darling, teaching was the obvious next step in his career.

"The more experience you have, the more you can develop a piece, and the better you get," Darling said. "The more I learned, the more I wanted to play.

The more I played, the more I wanted to learn. Eventually down the road I said 'Yeah, I want to teach,'"

In his current position at BSC, Darling conducts the Wind Ensemble, and teaches instrumental conducting, music theory and technology courses.

"Working with Dr. Darling is so fun," Matalyn Lund, sophomore at BSC and saxophone player in the band, said. "He is so educated and picks amazing pieces for us to perform. It's really great to have someone like him lead a band."

His passion for music fed his desire to learn more and pass that knowledge onto his students.

"Playing music and the act of creating music is something you get hooked on, and so I just wanted to play and get better," Darling said. "The more you increase your skills the harder the music gets which pushes you to get better,"

Darling's extensive musical experience opened the doors to a possible career in performing. After weighing his options he decided what path in his musical adventure to take.

"I wasn't sure I wanted to be a performer, that takes a lot," Darling said. "You have to be on top of your game because it is very competitive. You have to be the best of the best and that's only to get through the door. You have to compete against all these people who are just as good as you to get the position so you can actually make a living."

Walking into class everyday Darling is ready to teach, but for him that means much more than just leading

the rehearsal.

"It's watching the kids grow, watching the students figure it out," Darling said. "Having been instructed or giving them something and telling them how to make it work and watching them fix it and then bring it back and say 'How's that?' Watching that process is always the reward,"

A prolific composer, Darling creates his own music and listens to it come to life.

"As a composer, it's nice to hear my own charts," Darling said. "That's self-gratification versus the professional gratification of watching students learn how to do what you told them to do. Then watching them discover what they can do next."

Darling's knowledge of composing and active teaching style engages his students and creates a positive learning environment.

"He is so helpful because he actually knows the music," Tinashe Mukoii, sophomore trombone player, said. "he knows how to play it but also knows all the history behind it. Everytime he gives us a new piece of music, I learn something new. I never know what to expect and that makes the rehearsal process amazing,"

With the upcoming holiday season quickly approaching, Darling and the rest of the music department is preparing for the holiday upcoming concert.

"All of us are currently working on it. It's a little bit of everything and encourage all to come," Darling said. "We try to make it a collage of all the different

sections of the music department."

The concert will include the concert choir, men's and women's choirs, as well as the Chamber singers. All the instrumental groups currently practicing will also be included. The band, which is directed by Darling, along with the brass, percussion, and the guitar ensembles.

"Anyone who has been to one of our holiday concerts knows that there is a great variety of music, all of the ensembles perform," Darling said. "It usually takes about an hour but it goes by so quick that people can hardly believe it's already over."

or those that have been living under a rock for the past 20 years, Pokémon is a roleplaying game in which players travel make-believe lands collecting cute little monsters called Pokémon. Pokémon Sun/Moon was released Nov. 18 and introduced the seventh generation of Pokémon; bringing the total of collectable Pokémon to 801 different species.

The game was released in two versions, Pokémon Sun and Pokémon Moon. The differences between the two versions are the available Pokémon a player can catch and the day/night cycle within the game world. Pokémon Sun runs a standard day and night cycle, while Pokémon Moon's cycle is twelve hours offset. This offset allows for players who have a life during the day not to miss out on hunting day time Pokémon during evening hours.

Each person plays Pokémon in a unique way and for different reasons. Some gamers play to complete the story, and others have been playing for many generations attempting to collect every species of Pokémon. The most hardcore of Pokémon players selectively breed Pokémon to create the most optimal Pokémon for online battles and tournaments.

Pokémon Sun/Moon is \$39,99 and is available at retailers and the Nintendo eShop for the Nintendo 3DS.

he Xenoverse saga is a definite creative spin to the long running Dragonball series. Rather than playing as Goku and reliving the story retold a million times over, players create a character and help the Dragonball characters restore a broken timeline.

Dragonball Xenoverse 2 plays like a fighting game, but it is truly a roleplaying game. Characters level up with experience and develop as progress is made within the game. Different sets of armor and fighting abilities are collected by defeating opponents and successfully completing quests. Most, if not all, the loot is dropped by a random number system so prepare for some frustration and long hours grinding to complete the armor sets.

The game holds true to the source material and is played at a rather fast speed. Characters become blurs as they evade each other's ki blasts, and players ping pong around the screen off each others kicks and punches. The game can have a frantic nature, but overcoming that chaos and maintaining stamina and ki is what separates the great from mediocre.


