

# CAMPUSWIDE ADJUSTMENTS MADE TO ACCOMMODATE STUDENTS OFF CAMPUS AND THOSE REMAINING ON CAMPUS

A lot has changed for Bismarck State College since social distancing started because of the coronavirus outbreak.

Classes switched to be completely online since Spring Break and will remain that way for the rest of the semester and also throughout the summer semester.

Students who were staying in the dorms were asked to go home if possible or to stay home, if that's the case, to further continue their education online.

Some students in the dorms couldn't go home or didn't have the option.

In that situation, BSC has made resources available for those students

Computer labs are available for use in the Student Union. They are open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

The BSC Library is still available to students, staff and faculty both on campus and online. To visit the Library on campus, a BSC or North Dakota University System ID must be

shown when entering.

The on campus Library hours are Monday to Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. The online resources are available anytime.

The on campus Mystic Advising and Counseling Center is not open but Academic Tutoring, Advising, and Personal Counseling is still available to students through phone calls and emails. Students can contact a MACC adviser or counselor at [bsc.advising@bismarckstate.edu](mailto:bsc.advising@bismarckstate.edu) or [bsc.counseling@bismarckstate.edu](mailto:bsc.counseling@bismarckstate.edu)

The Mystic Marketplace is still open to students residing in the dorms but they are advised to eat their meals in the residence halls. Lunch services are 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. during the weekends. Supper services are 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday only.

Grab & Go is available from 11 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

All food services will be at the Mystic Marketplace pick-up window.

Mystic Java has new hours as well. They are open Monday through Friday 7:30 a.m. until 4 p.m.

# BISMARCK STATE COLLEGE'S MISSION TO SELL BOOKS PRINTED BY THE DAKOTA INSTITUTE

On the top floor of the Bismarck State College Bookstore rests a lone shelf of books, far apart from the textbooks and course material in the lower level of the store. Hardcover books of various shapes, authorship and genre all have one key trait in common: the publisher.

The Dakota Institute was a book publishing company founded in 2010 as part of the Lewis and Clark Fort Mandan Foundation. It was a way of bringing stories of the northern prairies to readers in not just the Peace Garden State but the rest of the world.

The Dakota Institute was later purchased by the State of North Dakota, and the manuscripts were given to the N.D. State Historical Society and Bismarck State College to be sold by the two institutions.

Dr. Larry C. Skogen, President of Bismarck State College, would entrust this task to BSC Assistant Professor of Management Kevin Cavanagh, who would work to promote and sell the books with his classes.

"Through the years my classes have taken different books at different times and promoted those books and sold them," Cavanagh said.

Cavanagh's classes have hosted various events from poetry contests for promotion of collections of poetry to special Black Friday sales of the pieces.

The main problem with the selling of the books, according to Cavanagh, is that they had already been promoted

with their initial release, and there is no additional money for new marketing campaigns.

"It's not like the legislature said here's 80,000 books and some money to help market the books," Cavanagh said. "That's never happened, so we've had to do this at zero marketing budget, and that's been the challenge."

The BSC Bookstore is presently in

charge of holding onto the books, some even existing in niche genres that do not often get sold except to specific audiences.

"A guy from Ireland had emailed me, and he was collecting every single book that had—he had a weird library connection—that had any kind of an Irish author to it," said BSC Assistant Professor of Management Kevin

Cavanagh. "So he bought a couple books of Irish descent."

# TRANSITIONING THE HEALTH SCIENCE LABS IN THE WAKE OF COVID-19

## A Look Into the Life of A Health Science Student and Accommodating Curriculum To Online Formats

They are always the first ones to come and help you. The first people you call in times of need or trouble. Paramedics and EMTs work hard to save lives everyday. These students go through strenuous training to become the best they can be in their field.

Alecia Turner is a current student in the Paramedic Program at Bismarck State College. In fact, she is the only paramedic student that lives here on campus, along with being an RA in Swenson Hall. But doing the Paramedic Program was not her first career choice.

After high school, Turner moved to Arizona to go to school to become a Massage Therapist. After finishing the courses she needed there, she moved back to North Dakota and started her own business. During this time, Turner found her new interest.

"I had just moved back from Arizona and I had thought about how being an EMT would be super cool, but I could never do that, because it's just too scary and I couldn't push myself to do that," Turner said. "I had told my parents I was interested in the position and becoming an EMT."

Emergency Medical Technicians and paramedics are trained and certified to help with basic emergency services to any victims of trauma or acute illnesses. They are the ones that help before and during transportation to a hospital. The difference being that it takes much longer to become a paramedic, and they are trained to complete more complex procedures

than EMT's. These procedures can include starting IVs, performing tracheostomies, and administering different medications to help save lives.

Bismarck State College provides EMT, AEMT(Advanced Emergency Medical Technician) and Paramedic classes on campus. The campus provides these certifications at different times throughout the year.

Turner's parents told her they had heard of an EMT class that would be starting the next day.

"So I just decided to go to it, and I decided to take the leap," Turner said.

Meanwhile, Turner was still running her Massage Therapy business, making it impossible to commit herself fully to the EMT program like she wanted to.

"I volunteered when I could," Turner said, "and I eventually fell in love with it and decided that I wanted to get into paramedicine and make that a full time gig."

The Paramedic Program is a full time task and is definitely not an easy one.

"I go to class for about 12 hours a week, sometimes 20, then when we are not in class we are at a clinic sight," Turner said. "We have a number of requirements and patient contacts we have to fulfill, along with

hours. For the fall semester we needed 156 hours of clinic time. For the spring semester we need 280 hours. And for our Capstone—where we can actually take the lead as a paramedic role—120 hours."

Along with that the students also go to places such as the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), Obstetric ward (OB), psych ward and ambulance

is a scenario of when you would first come on a scene and load them into the ambulance, take them to the hospital, call it and report into the ER."

Passing this test does not mean that the students are finished. Once they pass the program, they have to pass the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians, or NREMT. The national test where students will gain their license and can then apply for a job as a paramedic.

According to the Paramedic Training Spot website, they say that on average, about 33 percent of paramedics fail on their first try. The test is designed to determine the people who are ready to take on the role of a paramedic and those who are not.

The test consists of two parts, one written test and one is showing skills the students know how to perform.

The paramedic program at BSC started in August and was scheduled to have the students graduating in July. But with unfortunate circumstances and campus classes being moved to online, the program cannot be fulfilled.

"With the whole COVID-19, we were supposed to graduate in July but now it is unknown," Turner said. "They canceled all labs for the rest of the year. It's unfortunate because that's where we practice our skills on assessment before performing them on patients."

Turner also shared how it is a struggle attending their clinic sites, due to hospitals not wanting to bring in any COVID-19 carriers to the patients.

Until then many of these students in the program are in a time of unknown.

ride alongs. To add on to that, they also have classes on campus.

"Learning in the class is just a little bit of everything," Turner said. "We learn cardiology—two classes in that, which was pretty extensive. We had pharmacology, which is just knowing and learning the different medications and how they affect the cells and the body."

Turner shared that they also learn about different strokes and situations that can happen to people and how to treat them.

The students go through lectures and then go to labs to do hands-on training. At the end of the year, students get tested on everything they know using a variety of stations.

"The overall test can be with different things such as cardiology and identify different rhythms and how to treat them," Turner said. "Another station

Doom Eternal is a 2020 fast-paced, first-person shooter that was developed by id Software LLC and published by Bethesda Softworks. It is the sequel to the 2016 hit Doom and picks up two years after the events of that game. The player plays as the Doom Slayer as he travels across Hell-infested Earth, other planets, gladiator arenas, and more, trying to stop the demonic invasion of Earth.

The game is absolutely beautiful and packed with tons of detail, hidden secrets and Easter eggs like a screen listing all of id’s QA team members. The worlds are vast and beaming with life; the enemies are massively detailed but simple, so the player can figure out the enemy’s attack pattern.

When it comes to combat, oh boy! How would a person describe the combat? Imagine if 2016 Doom went on vacation, had a sudden burst in speed, drank gallons of Redbull, ran a marathon, came back and declared war on the world. That is what the combat is like in Doom Eternal.

There are moments where the game throws a pile of enemies at the player and not only does the player have to keep moving, dodging and jumping, the player also has to keep track of the flamethrower to get armor, two grenade types and a chainsaw to get ammo. The game gets slightly easier as the player gets the BFG (Big F\*\*\*ing Gun), a sword, and upgrades, but not by much as the game continues to throw out demons to slay.

The combat is smooth and exhilarating and heightened by the amazing score by Mick Gordon. He continued the heavy metal and satanic music from the last game and

increased it to 11. Players playing the game will feel his music blast into their ears. It is a great musical choice to listen to as they slay demons.

When it comes to technical problems in the game, there weren’t many. Everything was smooth, had no crashes or freezes. Even when the game throws 30 demons on screen, the frame rate still manages to be steady.

There are a few nitpicks with the game. There is an enemy type called the Marauder. This demon can block attacks, move really fast, dodge, shoot his shotgun if the player gets too close, throw his axe if the player goes too far away, summon his dog, can block the BFG, and can only be attacked when his eyes glow green. It is not a bad enemy and does keep players on their toes, but it can be too much for a casual player. A few tweaks to his movement and the frequency of his dog spawning in would help.

While a lot of the areas are open

and explorable, some areas feel constricted. For example, there is an area with a 1-UP that is sitting on a pedestal. Now, it looks like it can be reached. Just take the booster, dash to the pedestal and invisible wall, preventing the player from getting the item. It wouldn’t be a problem, but the item is sitting out in the open, but not obtainable due to the invisible wall. The two nitpicks that are listed doesn’t make this game a bad game, just a small annoyance.

Doom Eternal is a great game; hell, could be Game of the Year. The combat is great, the graphics are stunning, and the amount of collectables and upgrades will take awhile to get them all. It is a super fast-paced game that at times relies on quick thinking and knowledge of the area as it throws a ton of powerful demons at the player, so it may be a turn off for some, but for others, it is a hell of a time!


The show utilized an interesting technique of getting photography from set locations and using a gaming
