

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BSC COMMUNITY IS GETTING SMART ABOUT ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

The advancement of new technologies always raises some serious questions. Will computers take over? Will they take our jobs? What will our purpose be if everything is made up of A.I. technology?

A.I. stands for Artificial Intelligence. In layman's terms, technology can do things that humans can do. A.I. bots can speak different languages, solve math problems and even learn human emotions. A.I. technology operates by using algorithms that analyze data and identify patterns.

The latest chatbot released by Elon Musk-founded OpenAI is called ChatGPT. It's a text-generating A.I. system that allows users to ask the bot anything they want. Need to write a paper on quantum physics? The bot can do that. Want to write a story like this one? It can do that as well.

Professors at Bismarck State College are already preparing for the bot to influence their students' work in class.

"I'm certain there are students out there that will, are or have written papers with it," said Michael Tomanek, BSC associate professor of English.

Tomanek said the bot is not always accurate and can give generic and uncreative responses.

He said that if used in class it's not technically plagiarism, though, it is still considered to be academic dishonesty. Tomanek decided to get ahead of the curve and used the chatbot as a part of his class syllabus.

"I thought what better than to have the bot itself write a statement that says it can't be used in the class. And it wrote a very straightforward, clean paragraph saying not to use it," Tomanek said.

It can be hard to distinguish writing made by ChatGPT from human writing. Apps can help detect them by determining if a field of text used a certain code.

Tomanek said that professors should be able to recognize the written voice of their students.

"We've had plagiarism checkers for years, but the biggest plagiarism checker is ourselves,"

Tomanek said. "You read something that either ... doesn't seem like the student who I've been working with, or ... you get to the middle of a paper and you're like 'wait a minute, the voice changed'."

ChatGPT can be useful. Tomanek said that he uses the chatbot for assignments in class to help students understand how the bot works and the importance of individual style and creativity.

Tomanek had the bot write up love poems in class and said the result was unoriginal and poorly written, with standardized rhyme schemes. Tomanek and his class used examples to discuss the characteristics and features of bad poetry.

"We will eventually use it in other classes by simply analyzing it,"
Tomanek said. "If it were a literature class, you could ask it a question because it knows plenty about published texts. So, if you ask it the themes, it will tell you the themes."

Tomanek said by analyzing the answers the bot gives and fact-checking it, students can better understand proper uses for ChatGPT in the classroom and in everyday life.

"In conclusion, ChatGPT's responses may be limited by its training data and lack the nuance and complexity that only human educators can provide. Additionally, there is a risk of overreliance on technology, which can result in a loss of critical thinking and problem-solving skills," ChatGPT

wrote. "Therefore, it is essential to use ChatGPT alongside human instruction and ensure that students receive a wellrounded education that includes the human element."



STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION VOTES ON STUDENT FEE INCREASE

The Bismarck State College Student Government Association completes a multitude of tasks throughout the academic year. One of the most vital tasks is voting whether to approve changes to student fees for the following year.

Executive Vice President Rebecca Collins approaches SGA annually with changes to student fees. Collins takes into account the individual and organizational needs of those on campus and suggests increases or decreases. SGA then votes on the proposal.

"Just like how you and I have to look at our own checking accounts ... the Executive VP does the same thing for the school," SGA Adviser Catherine Brule said.

The budget this year features a few major increases. One is a 45 cent increase for the student activity fund. SGA says this increase is partly to address rising expenses with current events due to inflation; however, they do plan on hosting more events on campus next year.

"[The increase] really is to support all of the fun student activities on campus that you see here in the union or all around campus," SGA President Ian Broxmeyer said.

Another major increase is for the technology fee, one that usually doesn't see an increase from year to year. A \$1.01 increase was suggested for the launch of a mobile app for students. This app would allow students to log-in to their Campus Connection and Blackboard accounts, along with other features. The app, which is already being used by two other North Dakota University System institutions, will replace Mystic Mobile—a social media app for BSC students that was discontinued by SGA last spring.

"In previous years [the technology fee] has stayed at \$7 per credit, for several years. And, so, the fact that inflation is always happening and that hasn't changed, is spectacular," Brule said.

Only one area of the student fee budget was decreased. Money

toward[a][b] student organizations is being slashed by 15 cents. Broxmeyer says this is due to student organizations having money already in their savings. With student fees



THE BSC FOUNDATION DISCUSSES LATEST SUCCESS AND EVENTS

When it was initially founded in 1939, Bismarck State College was called Bismarck Junior College. The organization responsible for handling the junior college's assets was called the Bismarck College Corporation.

As the name and goals of Bismarck Junior College changed, the Bismarck College Corporation would change with it and become what is recognized today as the Bismarck State College Foundation.

The BSC Foundation is a non-profit organization on campus that supports the college with student scholarships, grants and fundraising efforts.

Their stated goal is, "Engage in those activities that support and assist in the development and advancement of Bismarck State College."

During this past February, BSC Foundation Development Manager Cory Wrolstad and his team members were already looking ahead to the Fall 2023 Semester.

"It's that time of the year where we start giving out scholarships for the next school year," Wrolstad said. "We are giving out close to a million dollars, if not more, in scholarships for BSC students next year in all fields and all walks of life."

Aside from a focus on scholarships, the BSC Foundation also played a part in Giving Hearts Day 2023, an annual 24-hour fundraiser for non-profit causes in the community.

The BSC Foundation will be donating \$4,700 in food and hygiene products that will go toward stocking the emergency food pantry on campus. They also raised money for the Project Care Program to assist students with emergency needs.

"Our goal is to keep those students engaged with college," Wrolstad said. "We don't want them to stress out over emergency situations."

The BSC Foundation is planning two upcoming events. In May, they will be hosting the Alumni Dinner with an awards and recognition ceremony.

On June 9, they will be setting up the 28th Annual BSC President's Cup, a golf tournament that raises money for athletic scholarships.

BSC CONTINUES TO SEE ENROLLMENT INCREASES

BISMARCK, N.D –Enrollment at Bismarck State College continues to see increases, breaking an academic year enrollment record from seven years ago.

BSC's enrollment increased by 20.19% for the spring 2023 semester according to a report from administration. An additional 3,941 students registered for class this semester.

This growth is the largest in the North Dakota University System and marks the first time in 10 years where spring enrollment is higher than fall enrollment during the same academic year.

Dual credit enrollment also jumped by 108%, with 41 high school students also being considered full-time BSC students.

The five programs with the largest growth are Surgical Technology, Medical Laboratory Technician, Electrical Power Technology, and Cyber Security and Computer Networks.

REGISTRATION NOW OPEN

BISMARCK, N.D. – Fall 2024 semester registration is open to all BSC students.

Students can register for classes by logging into their campus connect and accessing the manage classes panel.

Students can also access the acadmeic requirements panel to see which classes they may need for their degree path.

Students should sit down with their adviser and look at program requirements to make sure they sign up for the right classes.

Students can also register for summer semester courses or apply for graduation.

BISMARCK-MANDAN SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA SPRING CONCERTS HAVE BSC CONNECTION

With spring right around the corner, the Bismarck-Mandan Symphony Orchestra is preparing for their final two concerts, one of which has a Mystic connection.

The BMSO and Beverly Everett, Music Director and Conductor for BMSO and Bemidji Symphony Orchestra, have been planning their spring season for over a year. The music, musicians and everyone involved backstage have been practicing and rehearsing for months to present their concerts to the Bismarck-Mandan area.

"Typically for big concerts, we'll have five rehearsals," Everett said.

The Belle Mehus Auditorium, located in downtown Bismarck, will host the BMSO's last two concerts of the 2023 spring season.

On Saturday, March 11 the "BMSO Presents: Between Two Cultures" concert will start at 7:30 p.m. The event is a celebration of local culture and will feature music from Russell Peterson's "Between Two Cultures," Lakota "Victory Songs" and a concerto by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor.

This concert has several connections with people from Bismarck State College. Professor of Music Dr. John Darling's short tone poem "The Wolves of Yellowstone" begins the program. It is a piece dedicated to the reintroduction of wolves into Yellowstone National Park.

BSC Assistant Professor of Music Jason Thoms will be part of the Victory Songs performance. According to Everett, he's been a part of the planning

"Jason was the one that turned me onto this music. He came here in the fall of 2020 as the Choir Director of BSC and I got to know him," she said.
"Before he even arrived, colleagues of
mine that went to school with him said
'this man is coming and you got to meet
him. He's talented and a wonderful
person' and they were right about that."

BSC Student Nathan Sagsveen has been performing in the BMSO this season on the Double Bass. Sagsveen first played with Everett during a student conducting recital last summer.

"I was playing piano at that recital, so [Sagsveen] was right next to me," Everett said. "It was really hard music, and I was kind of blown away. I thought, where did this guy come from?

"So, he auditioned for our orchestra and got in. He has been fulfilling the principle bass role most of the time which has been really great. He deserves it. He's a leader. As a conductor every time I look over at him, he doesn't miss a thing. In the type of music we play, sometimes they have very difficult things to play, count and do advanced techniques, but he's been super."

The orchestra will present their season finale on Saturday, April 15 with "BMSO Presents: Young Artist Crescendo" concert. The orchestra will feature the Dvorak Symphony No. 8 and their Young Artist Competition winners.

The local thrift store Plato's Closet is helping students to find fashionable, reasonably-priced clothing within the store. From fun-friendly fashion to accessories and shoes, the store focuses on quality clothing at a discount.

Store co-owner Jerri Poppe-Werner started the Bismarck franchise in 2005. She knew about the chain from her time living in Minneapolis and saw it as a perfect opportunity to be her own boss after moving back to Bismarck.

"My mom is my partner—we went to training, found a place to rent and started to take buying from the public," Poppe-Werner said.

Success has not always come so easy. People in Bismarck were skeptical to the idea.

"In Bismarck, N.D. [this] wasn't always looked upon as favorable, and I get that because that's how I was growing up here," Poppe-Werner said.

Today, the business is thriving and Platos Closet helps with events around

the Bismarck-Mandan area. Nothing goes to waste, any overflow of clothing gets donated to help Youthworks during the "We've Got You Covered" event.

"[We've Got You Covered] is for all the people who can't even shop in places like this. They get to come and pick up free clothes, so I make sure the rest of my clothes that are leftover don't go into a landfill," Poppe-Werner said.

Poppe-Werner encourages clothes to be washed before bringing them in to be purchased by staff, even if they have not been worn for some time.

Students can also sell their gently used clothing to the store for cash or store credit. Most of the clothing comes from teens and young adults, but Poppe-Wener says all are welcome to donate.

"We have all ages shopping here—my dad, who is 74 and cool as heck—he shops here," Poppe-Werner said.

The store offers students a 15% discount when they show their ID. Plato's Closet can be found on all social media accounts.

ROBERT BURNS NIGHT CELEBRATES THE FAMOUS SCOTISH POET

Robert Burns was a 18th century Scotsman poet and a political satirist. He was married to Jean Armour, who was a daughter of a Master Mason.

Burns wrote many poems with the most recognizable being Auld Lang Syne. He got the nickname 'Horny Burns' from the content of some of his poems.

The friends of Robert Burns decided to celebrate his life in 1801. The celebration has grown around the world ever since.

"Robert Burns night started being celebrated at least 200 years ago,"

said John Young, who is a bagpiper in the Fez and Thistle Bagpipe Band and Drums. "Bismarck has been celebrating for eight years here [at the Masonic Lodge]." This year's Burns night was celebrated on January 21.

One of Burns poems, "Scotsman Selkirk Grace" is the poem said before eating. Robert Burns night is a celebration for many reasons, such as to remember an old Scottish poet, to honor the haggis with a poem written by Burns or to hear the bagpipes bringing in the haggis.

Haggis is a Scottish dish made of sheep's pluck and mixed with oats and spices. The bringing in of the haggis has a sword that goes first to protect it after that the haggis goes next. The bagpipes are after the haggis with the drums following behind.

The poem, "Address the Haggis" is read aloud to the audience after the ceremony is done, people are allowed to eat and converse while bagpipes are played in the background.

"The ceremony of the haggis is to honor the Scottish national dish and in a way poke fun of the English," Young said.

Other dishes presented that night are scotch eggs, drunken cabbage, cullen skink and scotch beef stew.

The Fez and Thistle Bagpipe Band and Drums played throughout the night. One of the songs was played on smaller pipes so that it could be duetted by someone who sang Auld Lang Syne.

The band has 15 active members. The band's members range in age from 16 to 80 years old. They are scattered throughout North Dakota and other states but they come together to perform and celebrate.

They are currently in a rebuilding year after Covid. The band is recruiting new members to learn bagpipes and drums.

The Fez and Thistle Bagpipe Band and Drums perform for the Circus in April and they perform for the highland games in Beulah, around the first or second weekend in October

Every season of play for NJCAA basketball presents something new for the players.

This season, in particular, presented solid teams and close scores across the board, making the competition fierce for every women's team. This has not gone unnoticed by Bismarck State College Women's Basketball Head Coach Thai Haggin.

"Our conference this year is a bit of a pile-up. Meaning anything can happen on any day, anybody can beat anybody," she said. "That's what I think is different this season compared to last season. I don't think there's one team in our conference that can just run away with everything."

The Mystics Women's team presented a 16-11 overall regular season record, along with a 13-8 record in the MonDak Conference. Part of the Mystic's successes this past season was their ability to control the ball and swipe it from under the other team's noses. The four sophomores and 6 freshmen managed to find scoring opportunities in consistently close games with the victor coming down to the wire even in the final minute.

One final roadblock at the end presented itself in four away games against tough opponents beginning with North Dakota State College of Science, who beat the Mystics in their first game together by 10 points and the second game by only one point. With a previous away record of four wins and one loss before this series of games, this presented a long road to the end of the season for the Mystics who played mostly at home.

"I say the same thing almost every game: When we prepare, we prepare for what we have to do, not for what they are going to do," Haggin said. Those final four road games saw the Mystics tally two wins and two losses. They pulled off victories against Miles Community College and Lake Region State College, but dropped their games against NDSCS and Dawson Community College..

With the Mystics season ending, recruitment of new players is on the horizon as the team says goodbye to the current sophomore roster and welcomes in freshman players.

"This year's group of athletes have been unbelievable as far as just great teammates. I'm proud to be their coach," Haggin said.

"The ones who succeed are the ones who get back up," Pearce said.

Kyle Odenbach, a starting pitcher for the BSC Mystics, feels this year's team is a special group.

"I think we could do some pretty good things, maybe go pretty far in the conference and hopefully maybe even farther than that," Odenbach said.

YOU'RE NOT BEING KIND YOU'RE MAKING ME UNCOMFORTABLE

The most common compliment I have been rewarded while living in a predominantly white state has been that I am pretty for a Black girl which was said with an eerie smile on the strained faces of those whose teeth have been straightened by \$3,000 wires.

I am expected to appreciate the sentence with open arms and feel universally accepted because a person who fits Eurocentric beauty standards finds my ethnic features accommodating in comparison to those of my race.

That is no compliment.

The idea of needing to include one's race or background in order to converse with them is an idea that is entirely inappropriate.

Calling on Native-American students to pronounce words in a book centered on Native-American culture or asking a person of color where "they're really from... like actually from" after they have answered with one of the 50 states— is micro-aggressive despite believing it is done with positive intentions.

Asking a woman if she is pregnant is deemed inappropriate, and just as that question is humiliating, so are microaggressions. The notion that what is said is always interpreted as it's meant is fueled by ignorance. The assumption that we know the impact and how to censor all of our sentences is impractical.

If the entirety of humanity were to censor itself to accommodate every individual, communication would cease. Though this may seem hyperbolic, the point still stands that no person is all knowing.

This does not diminish the concept of common sense. If a person with curly hair came up to a person whose hair is bone straight and started petting them frantically while displaying a childlike wonderance, bystanders might find the interaction odd—especially when the person being petted looks uncomfortable.

It is one thing to be ignorant of a matter, and it is another to knowingly remain ignorant simply because it would take too much effort to change. Dark humor is not an excuse to make racist jokes nor can it be justified by being a member of a marginalized group or having Black friends. There are things that are appropriate to say and do and things that just shouldn't be said and done.

I can recall several times where I have been followed in a store simply because I had "looked suspicious" to the workers when in reality I was just a Black woman in a hoodie.

The uneasiness that settles in my bones because I recognize I look criminal in skin that I cherish is a feeling that can be avoided with education.

Microaggressive comments and actions do not provide the comfort that people believe they do, and when done on purpose those comments make the person they're directed at feel uncomfortable.

I am not stealing; I am just shopping. I do not care if you have several Black friends.

You do not know what I go through as a racial minority because you are a member of the LGBTQIA+ or because you're a woman. No, you may not touch my hair without permission. I am from the United States, so stop asking. I am not pretty for a Black girl, I am just pretty.

SAVE MONEY, LIVE BETTER EAT AT HOME

When people think chicken, they think chick-fil-a. The establishment came to the Bismarck-Mandan area back in November and there is never downtime at the restaurant.

Dinner time rolls around, and one is craving chick-fil-a, the drive-thru is at least a half hour wait time, Dine in is even worse. Save on time, gas, and food cost and make the sandwich at home.

The large Chick-fil-a deluxe sandwich combo with waffle fries and a drink costs \$10.29 which is not including gas and wait time. However, this can be made at home for seven dollars with four servings instead of one.

Keep in mind, eating out is not a sin. Several people eat out because they don't have the time to cook, or it's a special occasion, or just a treat to oneself. Ordering take out is not the enemy. These recipes are designed to help satisfy cravings or substitute for food allergens on a budget.

This recipe replicates the sandwich well. Be sure to marinate the chicken for the full time in order to allow for optimal marinade.

When making this recipe, if using cheese, American cheese works the best due to how evenly it melts.

If one would like the spicy version of

this sandwich, all one would need to do is add one to two teaspoons of cayenne pepper to the dry breading mixture.

There's a few tricks to cooking that allow for well crafted food. First, everyone makes bad food sometimes. Not every dish will be Gordon Ramsey level cuisine, but the important thing is the attempt at improvement.

Second, cooking is not an exact science. Adding a little over or under on the garlic powder is not going to make or break a recipe.

A recipe is more of a roadmap versus a protocol. The recipe tell how to get to the end result, but there is more than one way to get there.

The last trick is to taste the food while it's cooking. Many go into cooking with an expectation on how something is supposed to taste, but wait until the end to try it. Especially when making sauces, it's important to try the food as it's simmering.

There is not always a way to taste test, an example would be fried foods, but when applicable, it's important to try and adjust along the way.

With these thoughts in mind, be adventurous, try new foods, experiment with flavors, and don't be afraid to fail, take out is always an option.

Breading Dry ingredients

- 1 c. Flour
- 3 tbsp. Powdered Sugar
- ½ tsp. Paprika
- 1 tsp. Black Pepper
- ½ tsp. Chili Powder
- ½ tsp. Salt
- ½ tsp. Baking Powder

Wet Ingredients

- ½ c. Milk
- 1 Large Egg

Chicken

- 4 ct. Chicken Breast
- ½ c. Pickle Juice
- ½ c. Water
- 2-3 c. Oil for Frying
- 4 ct. Hamburger Buns

Copy-Cat Chick-fil-a: Chicken Sandwich



Directions

- Cut the chicken breasts in half and marinate the pickle juice and water for
 minutes
- **2.** Mix dry breading ingredients
- **3.** Mix wet breading ingredients
- **4.** Add 2-3 cups of oil to a large saucepan and heat to 350°F degrees
- **5.** Coat chicken in breading. Start with the wet; end with the dry, repeat once.
- **6.** Pan fry for 3-4 minutes on each side
- 7. Toast sandwich buns and assemble sandwich

NOTES

- 1. Be sure to **cook** the **chicken** all the way through. Chicken should have an *i*nternal temperature of 165°F
- 2. This sandwich can also be made in the air fryer. Set at 370° greass the interior and lightly spray the chicken as well. Cook for 11 to 13 minutes.


During the conference, Taylor was given the Award for Best Documentary.
