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
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#### BISMARCK STATE COLLEGE'S

Wind Ensemble has been perfecting the composition "DARKlightNESS" (Light Within Darkness) since the beginning of the spring semester.

The 29 BSC students and five guest musicians from the community will be premiering the arrangement alongside the composer and guitarist, Jim Bonney, as part of BSC's ArtsQuest 2016.

"The piece is homage to great guitar sounds that have been enshrined in the electric guitar panthium," Bonney said. "What I am trying to do with this concerto is say, 'what if we take those [guitar] sounds and put them in a new setting – a new space in which they are performed – a new ensemble that's playing it, and – what happens to those sounds when we revisit them?" " It's ju

The three-movements composition will incorporate the musical stylings of legendary guitarists such as David Gilmore, Eddie Van Halen, Les Paul, Jimmy Page, Jimi Hendrix and Tom Morello. Bonney said each movement has its own feel and influences.

"Resetting what these musicians have done, with this piece and with this ensemble, I think creates something new and interesting," Bonney said. "It takes a mixture of audience and brings something of interest to them. It's not just for the wind ensemble audience. It's just not for the rock and guitar player audience. I think it creates something for both and maybe even further."

The day of the ArtsQuest performance will be the first time Bonney and the BSC Wind Ensemble come together. They will have a short practice before the premiere performance.

"They [BSC Wind Ensemble] have a surprise coming; they have only heard half of the piece," Bonney said. "The other half comes together when I get there. My part really enmeshes with them. It is not a flashy, showy guitar part, but a very textural guitar part. It really makes the ensemble complete when the guitar combines with the Wind Ensemble."

The premier will take place at 7:30 p.m. Monday, April 18, at the Sidney J. Lee Auditorium. The event is free of charge.

Bonney's career covers a spectrum of different types of musical mediums. He is credited for works on multiple AAA video games, television programs, trailers and documentaries. His credits include "BioShock Infinite," "King of the Hill" and "Buffy the Vampire Slayer."

certain elements. If the music goes too fast, it will make the play experience feel slower. And if the music goes too slow, it works in the opposite direction."

For many gamers, music can make or break the atmosphere within their gaming worlds.

"One thing I learned about doing music and sound design for video games, especially something as visceral as Mortal Kombat, is you have to take the energy up, like, ten times higher than you would in something like a slot machine or television show," Bonney said. "It can be difficult."

In addition to Bonney's music being heard throughout the realms of "Mortal Kombat: Armageddon," his voice can be heard as the character Sub-Zero.

"I worked on 'Mortal Kombat: Armageddon,'" Bonney said. "I did one third of the fight music. I did all the music for the single player campaign and I did half of the music for the gokart secret game."

Bonney said writing music for video games is different than writing traditional songs and concertos. He also said that there are many factors that have to be taken into account while writing video game music.

"With something like Mortal Kombat, there is a tradition that needs to be upheld," Bonney said. "I would listen to the old compositions to try and put a new spin on them. There is also an aspect of it that is entirely functional. It has to loop; it has to be a certain length of time; and it has to be able to react to

He did the voiceover work for the character's in-game sounds.


"It's weird to punch a character in the game and hear yourself go 'Ugh,'" Bonney said with a laugh. "My sister actually voiced the character Sonya Blade in the game. So it is also weird to punch that character and hear my sister's voice."

His audio production company, BigLoudSound, is a full service music production company. A few of his clients include Midway Games, 2K Games and NASA. Bonney is currently working the upcoming game "Mafia 3," and the Kickstarter game, "Perception."

# Stress Pets Visit the Union

THERE IS something relaxing about wet, slobbery kisses. For many people, interacting with a pet is the exact thing they need when they've had a stressful day.

On March 2, Bismarck State College's student union was flooded with animals. These pets were all certified therapy pets. Each animal had to go through a 10 point step test to become a certified therapy pet.

According to www. howstuffworks.com, "multiple studies indicate that pets are powerful forms of stress relief, lowering not only blood pressure but also harmful stress hormones like cortisol, which is associated with depression and anxiety, and elevating beneficial ones like oxytocin, which is linked to happiness and relaxation."

BSC student Eli Akin didn't know what to expect when he came into the student union for lunch.

"I have got to say it helps me a lot. I just found out something that really threw me through a curve yesterday, so it's really helped me calm down a lot," Akin said. "I grew up on a farm, and I only get home once a month if I'm lucky. This was a nice change of pace."

Joan Morton was one of the volunteers who brought in dogs, cats and bunnies to BSC. Morton brings therapy animals to relieve the stress during hard times of college or life.

"It really helps people who don't get to go home very often, who have family pets at home or may be feeling home sick," Morton said. "Animals always seem to show affection. They don't judge anybody because they love everyone."

Morton has been bringing stress pets to schools and nursing homes for four years. One animal in particular is Frankie, the golden retriever. She participates in obedience, agility and hunting.

Johanna Bjork, the campus reference and instructional librarian, organized this event and was in charge of bringing the therapy pets to campus for the last four years.

"I knew some people in town that did have official therapy animals," Bjork said. "They'd go out and travel among the schools, preschools, churches and other areas. So I had some connections, and when we started the Stress Ball here at BSC, I recommended we bring in therapy animals. Other libraries across the



nation have also begun to bring in therapy animals to their campuses."

The Student Government Association took note of the success it had on campus and will therefore be bringing


back Joan Morton and her therapy animals during finals week.

# **Local Bar Changes Image**

COLLEGE STUDENTS are always looking for something to do on a weeknight. Look no farther than the banks of the Missouri River.

"There's beer pong every night upstairs," Jacey Kramer, new manager of Rock Point, said. "On Tuesday's, we do karaoke from 6 p.m. on and then there's specials going on every night, as well."

Formerly known as Captain Freddy's, the new 21 and up riverside location is called Rock Point. The switch happened on Feb. 1 and officially reopened on Feb. 17 with Pop Evil, a nationally known American rock band.

Kramer, one of the new managers, is good friends with the owners and said she was excited about taking over Captain Freddy's. However, Kramer is unsure as to why the change in management was made.

"You know, I honestly have no idea," Kramer said. "Two of the owners that we're in with have VoDo Entertainment and they were bringing the bands here when it was Freddy's. They talked to [the owners of Captain Freddy's] and decided we were just gonna take over as management for it and do all the

concerts here and turn it more into a concert venue and bar."

The switch over to the concert venue and bar idea has been a solid one. The new management got rid of College Night, but the entire menu been

changed to accommodate the pub environment, and the new management is bringing in national bands as well as local bands.

"We're bringing in a lot of big bands," Kramer said. "We just had Hawthorne Heights. We had Pop Evil our first night. We have THC, the Texas Hippie Coalition, on April 20. There's a lot of big ones coming."

A major aspect to the success of Rock Point is the pub's ability to keep prices low for the customers interested in the concerts.

"We've been selling out a lot of our concerts, and we're trying to keep our ticket prices low, too," Kramer said. "The most expensive we've had is \$25. So we're keeping them as low as possible to get entertainment here."

The previous Captain Freddy's advertised live bands for every Friday and Saturday night. However, for Rock

Point, those two days aren't always concert nights.

"It all depends on when we book the bands," Kramer said. "We try to do them between Thursdays and Saturdays, mainly. But there's some that it only works on a Tuesday or Wednesday. So it's pretty much when we can get them is more or less how it goes. On weekends, we're trying to have music every weekend, whether it be local or national, so there's always something going on."

The new menu that Rock Point has constructed is very different from what the menu used to be. Options are pizza, philly cheese steaks with beef or chicken, cheese curds, jalapeno poppers and poutine, which is a


Canadian dish with fries, cheese curds and gravy.

"We completely got rid of the old menu," Kramer said. "It's all a bit more pub food now."

The reactions that Kramer has heard from the public since Rock Point has opened have been mainly positive.

"We've gotten really good feedback, so far," Kramer said. "People are really liking it, so that's a plus."

# **Alumnus Exhibits Sculptures**

STEVE LILLEGARD, a Bismarck State College alumnus, will be exhibiting his sculptures at the Elsa Forde Gallery in Schafer Hall April 13 - 15 with an informal artist meet and greet April 13 at 4 p.m.

Steve Lillegard was raised in central Montana. His artistic talents were supported by his mother, Elisabeth.

"My mother went to art school in Boston and she used to decorate the house when we were growing up," Lillegard said. "She painted a hallway with chalkboard paint so there was one section for every kid. We drew on the wall all the time, and as I grew up, I just kept drawing."

She would also take him to museums on family vacations to see work from master artists. Lillegard went on to major in fine arts at Montana State University.

Inspired by his time living in Montana, Lillegard's bronze-casted sculptures have been featured in several galleries, and he showed his work at BSC's alumni art show in 2015.

Lillegard's sculptures have a western and wildlife theme, which show historical accuracy and an eye for detail. The depictions of characters and animals of the Old West have a realistic look, as if they were captured in motion.

"Living in the west, the history and the wildlife has always interested me," Lillegard said.

Lillegard was invited to BSC as part of ArtsQuest 2016. ArtsQuest was developed out of a need to bring in artists, scholars, musicians and authors to have students exposed to a larger community outside of the college.

"The benefit for Steve is to show his work in this area, to get some people from the community to come up that might not have known about his work," Barbara Thorsen, assistant professor of art, said. "Or they're artists themselves and want to meet him and exchange ideas."

In addition to the meet and greet, Lillegard will also spend a few days in the classroom with students to discuss

his sculptures and what it is like to be an artist after college.

"I always liked sculpture, even as a little kid, but I never thought that was something I could make a living at until I went to an art show and saw someone else doing it," Lillegard said.

Giving art students the opportunity to meet with someone who makes his living through art helps them to see what options are after graduation, Thorsen said. "It has been a great opportunity for the college to not only serve the students but also get the community to come up and interact with the students," Thorsen said. "We're planting seeds; we're a transfer school. We want to enhance our classes by bringing in artists such as Steve."

# Comic Book Authority Visits Campus Story by: Brett Williamson

FOR MICHAEL Uslan, comic book historian and writer, his life changed with one comic book while growing up in New Jersey during the '50s.

The impact of that one comic book led him from comic collector to the executive producer of every Batman film since 1989. He is credited for the original four Batman movies, the Dark Knight trilogy and this year's "Batman V Superman: Dawn of Justice."

Uslan will be visiting Bismarck State College as part of ArtsQuest 2016 to share his tale of taking Batman from the pages of DC Comics to the silver screen and his experiences within the comic book industry.

"Comic books have been my passion since I was little," Uslan said. "It was my escapist entertainment. It was a world I could retreat to with the greatest superheroes on the planet, and I would allow that to carry my imagination rocketing off to outer space, or

alternate universes or beneath the sea. It is inspirational."

Before his 1989 Batman film changed the world of comics and film, it was a time when comics were considered taboo and a source of youth corruption. This was a time before the blockbuster superhero films the world sees today.

"In the early '50s, American parents, educators, administrators and clergymen were convinced comic books were a tool of the devil designed to create a generation of juvenile delinquents," Uslan said. "A lot of the aura of those times lingered over and as the people from that era, who were young adults, moved into position of authority and business, took with them that prejudice against comic books."

After securing the permissions to Batman for a motion picture in the late '70s, Uslan spent the next decade trying to convince Hollywood it was time for the comic industry to expand.

According to Uslan, it was an uphill battle for him to share his vision of Batman with the world.

"It was an endurance contest," Uslan said. "I was turned down by every single studio in Hollywood. They told me 'I was crazy,' 'you can't do serious comic book movies,' 'you can't do dark superhero movies' and 'you can't do a movie from an old TV series.' It was the epitome of frustration. The world at that point was not ready to embrace anyone outside of Superman as a comic book character that could be of value and could be made into a blockbuster motion picture."

Eventually, his vision of Batman was released in 1989, and broke box office records.

The success of "Batman" demonstrated that theater audiences were willing to accept a realistic interpretation of comics. The film laid the framework for modern day theatrical comic book storytelling.



Uslan is also credited for two Swamp Thing films – 2008's "Catwoman" and the "Where on Earth is Carmen Sandiego" television program. Currently, he is working on the production "Captain Marvel" and soon-to-be released "Lego Batman Movie."

Uslan said even though he worked with a variety of different comic titles over his career, Batman is still his favorite superhero.

"Batman had no superpowers, that is why I love the character so much," Uslan said. "When I was eight, I believed if I worked out really hard and my dad bought me a cool car, I could be Batman. He had the greatest super villains in history. Ultimately it is the supervillains that defines the superheroes."

Aside from contributions to film and comics, Uslan was the first professor of comics. He lectured the first fully

accredited comic book college course at Indiana University.

"Comic books as a legitimate American art form are as indigenous to this country as jazz and need to be recognized as such," Uslan said. "Comic books and superheroes are our modern day mythology. It's this mythology that is now being welcomed by not only people across borders, but people across cultures around the world. If we look no further than that, then comic books have made a true, amazing, educational and artistic contribution to the global society."

Uslan's presentation will start at 7:30 p.m. April 21, at the Basin Auditorium in the National Energy Center of Excellence.

This is a free event and there will be a Batman, Superman and Wonder Woman themed costume contest scheduled before the presentation at 7 p.m. Prizes will be awarded.


"I hope students walk away with the notion that you folks at this stage are on a mission to discover your passions in life," Uslan said. "It's great to go down many different paths, and it's just as important to learn what you don't like as you do like. Once you fix on your passion and identify what your dreams might be, then if you are willing to forfeit

what has become a multigenerational misguided sense of entitlement that the world owes you something or the world is going to come to you, and get up proactively off the couch and make things happen, then you can make your dreams come true."

From the boy with a comic book to the man that gave superheroes and supervillains a new breath of life for the modern age, Uslan gives a piece of advice for anyone wanting to pursue a career in film or writing.

"It's hard and doesn't happen overnight," Uslan said. "It takes passion, dedication, the ability to control your frustrations, to stick to it and to make a commitment — these are all very hard things to do. If you have the easy way out in life, and you don't have the passion coursing through your veins ... go find something easier to do. If my admonishments are not scaring you off, then you are probably already halfway there toward a path to success."

Trigger Warning: Movie Troll reviews contain spoilers and strong language not appropriate for little whiny sissy-britches.


THE FOLLOW-UP movie to "Man of Steel" and the second installment of DC's Extended Universe has arrived. "Batman V Superman: Dawn of Justice."

Bring a neck brace. This one hurts a bit.

The first 15 minutes open with a series of clips. Since "Man of Steel" is the sole precursor to "Dawn of Justice," the viewer needs a quick briefing on the main characters. This is followed by an additional 15 minutes of plot set up. Now that a full fifth of the movie is over, we can move from pre-dinner drinks and on to the meal.

At this point, everyone will notice this is not the normal superhero movie we have all become comfortable with. The movie is cold, dreary and grim

There is no comic relief. No sunny disposition. Not a single witty one-liner. There is a persisting serious tone. Batman grits his teeth against PTSD and Superman is suffering under an existential crisis.



And that's what this movie aims for. It isn't another origins story, and it isn't for the layman moviegoer. This is an appeal to the hardcore comic book fanbase.

The moviegoer may also notice, and likely complain about, a lack of explanation.

Not once in the whole movie is Wonder Woman named. We are told nothing of her origins, powers or motives. That's the point. Do we really need to be introduced to Wonder Woman? No, this

movie doesn't cater to the ignorant. The expectation is: if you're a superhero fan watching a superhero movie then you already know who the superheroes are. If you don't, then pick up a comic book and start where it all began.



While I am thankful for being spared the annoying corny quips, the movie is damn near a silent film. But I'm sort of digging that. As in a comic book, so much is told through the actions of the characters. Does Superman really need to say, "I got you" when he catches Lois Lane falling from a skyscraper? Hell no. I can already see that. Cutting the dialogue down to the essential and letting the visual cues tell the rest was a good decision. If you're blind, then perhaps an audiobook would be a better means of entertainment.

Perhaps Dawn of Justice can be considered a drama. There are numerous conflicting allegiances and rivalries, like some sort of bizarre love heptagon. It could very well take a dozen viewings to sort it all out. Wonder Woman v Doomsday v Batman (v Alfred) v Lex Luthor v Superman (v himself (v The Daily Planet)) v the American government v Doomsday. I don't know anymore. Let's move on to dessert.

Disasterporn. UrbanDictionary.com defines the term as, "A movie with lots of destruction and explosions and disasters. For example: Independence Day, The Day After Tomorrow, 2012." Though not quite at the level of total world destruction, Dawn of Justice deals with a crippling blow to the downtown Metropolis infrastructure.

As they say, leave no skyscraper uncollapsed. This is the big buildup we were edging for. A release of titanic proportions. Que full CGI mode.


Batman, Wonder Woman and Superman team up in a 3v1 face off with Doomsday, a forbidden mutant "Kryptonian Deformity" created by Lex using the dead remains of General Zod and a splash of his own blood.

Batman evades. POOF! Wonder Woman deals damage. THWACK! Superman takes a beating. CRASH! Both Superman and Doomsday fall dead after being weakened by Kryptonite. Doomsday lands a critical hit to Superman; arm bone spur to the chest.

Superman is buried in his mom's backyard. The film's last few frames suggest his resurrection.

Where does that leave us? Dawn of Justice cuts through all the BS introductions and gets to the good stuff. No fluff or back patting. Just raw story. # Voting in N.D.

NORTH DAKOTA is home to a variety of relaxed laws concerning voter rights, but according to N.D. Voices, an electronic voting information system, not even half of the state's population make their way to the voting booth. One reason for this could be the lack of public information regarding the topic.

North Dakota holds true to most common state voting laws. A voter must be 18 years of age, a resident of the United States and a resident of a certain district for at least 30 days prior to voting.

The similarities with North Dakota legislation ends there. To vote, residents do not need any prior registration.

North Dakota is the only state in the union to totally ignore voter registration laws. Although there is no registration, involved citizens must show voting staff a valid I.D., an I.D. issued by a tribal government or any identification issued by the secretary of state at each designated voting area.

Bismarck State College sophomore Richard Hagen chose not to vote last election.

"I don't pay much attention to politics and I think our government is so corrupt as it is," Hagen said. "Part of me believes the campaign is nothing more than a show to make it appear like democracy is a system."

It is unclear whether this ideology is present within the half of North Dakota voters that do not show up to the polls.

BSC has encouraged its students to take part in voting activities. BSC sophomore Heather Kaiser made the decision to vote in the last election.

"My experience was decent. I did prevoting. My friend had to leave town back to college, so we went early and grabbed a form, so we could vote together," Kaiser said. "Her family was very well-informed, and the lady

who gave us the form was good at explaining what to do."

Kaiser encourages students to participate in voting and to not be afraid to ask questions.

"Students must decide whether voting is a crucial part of our democratic society," Kaiser said.

Perspective voters can be on the lookout for school district elections April 1 - June 30, city elections June 14 and North Dakota governor and general elections Nov. 8.

#### Voting Absentee or by Mail – A Valid:

- ✓ North Dakota form of identification listed above
- ✓ Passport or Military ID Only for North Dakota residents living outside the United States who do not possess one of the other forms of identification.
- Attester An applicant without an acceptable form of identification may use an attester. The attester must provide his or her name, North Dakota driver's license, non-driver's, or tribal identification number, and sign the absentee/mail ballot application form to attest to the applicant's North Dakota residency and voting eligibility.

THIS YEAR is the 15th anniversary of April being sexual assault awareness month.

The National Sexual Violence Resource Center coordinates the awareness month campaign each year and promotes prevention of sexual violence through "research, resources and collaboration."

Laura Palumbo is the communications director for NSVRC and said there are many new audiences participating in the campaign, which, this year, is themed "prevention is possible."

"Over the years, we've seen participation grow, and people who are involved engaging their communities in more active ways," Palumbo said.

Recent publicity of incidents such as Ke\$ha's court case against her former music producer, Dr. Luke, and Lady Gaga opening up about being raped when she was 19 years old have gained national attention.

Gaga performed the song "'Till it Happens to You," alongside dozens of sexual assault survivors at The Oscars, which aired Feb. 28.

Vice President Joe Biden introduced her by saying, "Too many women and men, on and off of college campuses, are still victims of abuse." He also vowed to intervene in situations where consent has not been given.

Palumbo said public attention to sexual assault has empowered people to talk about the issue and learn about how they can be a part of the solution.

"High profile cases about sexual violence as well as public officials taking a stance on the issue of sexual assault have really opened up the conversation," Palumbo said.

Another campaign that has used celebrities and athletes is called NO MORE. This campaign is not owned by one organization; it is available to all those "who are committed to help end domestic violence and sexual assault."

NO MORE has launched several public service announcements that have featured celebrities and NFL players.

The website www.nomore.org, has information and resources for anyone interested. It also has a quick escape feature which will redirect the open page to Google if the "Esc" key is pushed.

Palumbo said she has noticed more people are aware of how to access resources, but it is also important to help all people understand how the issue affects everyone, not just those who are victims.

According to a survey conducted by the Association of American Universities, 23 percent of female college students said they had experienced a form of unwanted sexual contact. Along with that, 63 percent of student responders said they believed a report of sexual misconduct would be taken seriously by campus officials.

Palumbo said student activists have played a significant role in putting sexual violence on the public radar. She also said students have powerful voices and can be a part of changes.

Taking steps on campuses to create spaces for discussion and raising awareness are ways Palumbo said students can have roles in preventing sexual assault and violence.




Avery Privratsky is one of the two sophomores on the 2016 Mystic softball roster.

This season the Mystics have 14 women on the softball roster. Privratsky said she expects "to have fun and play hard."












Street Fighter V: Not Yet Complete

The Street Fighter franchise continued for the next 25 years with a series of sequels and spin-off games. The series mainstays, Ryu, Ken, Zangief and Chun-li, became some of the most recognizable and iconic characters in the gaming industry. Capcom with the Street Fighter series defined the standard of gaming.

In July 2008, Street Fighter IV hit the arcades. With annual updates to the roster every two years, by the end of Street Fighter IV's life cycle, players had the largest Street Fighter game to date. The game gave players 44 unique playable characters, multiple modes of play, continued story, online and ranked play. Following the success of Ultra Street Fighter IV, Capcom decided it was time for a new version.



Capcom released Street Fighter V on Feb. 11 for the PlayStation 4. Upon release, the game offered 16 fighters, a three round story mode, no arcade mode, no challenge mode, buggy servers and a list of DLC. The game was incomplete; an unannounced paid beta.

This release is nothing short of deceiving the longtime fans and robbing wallets of

a hard earned \$60. While the graphics and sounds are great, there is just not a whole lot for gamers to do in the game.

A justification for the state of the release is that the game has shifted gears to a competitive circuit. But if this was the case, why do players spend 20 minutes in an online lobby awaiting fight queues? Why can players quit midmatch to avoid a loss to their record? If this was supposed to be an online competitive game, one would think Capcom would have put more focus on their server optimization and penalizing "rage quitters." The inability to properly launch an acceptable online experience only supports the fact that this game is incomplete.



For the game that practically invented arcade mode, the lack of arcade mode is a slap in the face. In one bad decision, Capcom alienated a large fraction of their fan base. Not all gamers enjoy online modes of play. Many gamers enjoy playing the game alone unlocking achievements at a casual pace. The online environment of Street Fighter V can be toxic at times. For those that can play well, they will most likely spend a few rounds a night being cursed up and down just to have your opponent disconnect in final moments of the match to avoid a loss on their record.

The 16 characters are fairly balanced for a new release. There is no problem with having a fighting game with only 16 characters, but don't announce another five DLC characters before release that require players digging back into their wallets to pay more cash for characters that should have been released with the



game. Capcom claims characters can be purchased with in-game fight money. The details for the in game currency have not been officially released yet, but rest assured, if you want a free character, prepare to grind for those points.



The game itself plays fairly smooth. There is no problem pulling off super moves and classic 2-in-1 combos. The V-system is an interesting new approach to the game engine. The biggest let down of the gameplay is the one super move per character. This makes the gameplay feel limited and predictable when laying out a strategy mid-match.


This game receives an incomplete rating. I am sure, with time, this game will come together with multiple updates and trips back into my wallet. Buyer beware, if you are looking to play a story driven Street Fighter with multiple modes and characters, look somewhere else. If you are new to the series and this game sparks your interest, I suggest Ultra Street Fighter IV. It has more to offer than Street Fighter V with its reasonable price, roster and modes of play.



#### **Your Vote Doesn't Matter**

WITH PRESIDENT Obama's second term coming to an end, Americans are constantly bombarded with political ads. It seems one only needs to open their eyes and there's Donald Trump calling someone stupid or Bernie Sanders promising free education or Vermin Supreme pushing for mandatory tooth brushing laws. Teachers, pastors, police officers, politicians and everyone else imaginable are telling Americans to "do their civic duty and vote." And voters eat it all up. But in reality, a vote means very little – almost nothing.

If the average American was asked how presidents were elected he or she would most likely answer with "voters." In reality, presidents are voted on by a group called the Electoral College. The Electoral College and its functions seem to have little understanding among American voters. According to a 2011 study by Intercollegiate Studies Institute (ISI), 20 percent of those surveyed believed the Electoral College "trains those aspiring for higher office" and 43 percent were unaware the Electoral College casts votes for the President. Despite the average American's ignorance, these are the people saying "go forth and vote." In order to understand why a vote means very little, the Electoral College needs to be explained.

First, the Electoral College is a process and not a place. There is no secret room in Washington where elite businessmen and politicians meet and cast votes. Rather, the electors are a list of individuals pledged to a certain candidate from each of the political parties. Each state is granted a certain number of electors based on population. Electors are then chosen by the state's chief election official. After selection, electors wait for election night. Once the state's votes are tallied, electors vote. That being said, electors are not obligated to vote in line with the majority.

Prior to the 2012 election, nine of the previous 16 elections contained "faithless electors" (votes cast to a candidate not carrying that particular state). In fact, in 2004, an elector from Minnesota cast a vote for President to "John Ewards." Not only was this a miscast vote to John Edwards, who wasn't even running for President, it was a misspelling for someone who wasn't even a candidate. The write-in process of the Electoral College is so disconnected from the actual election, non-existent candidates can receive votes.

Out of the 50 states, 21 states do not require an elector to vote for its pledged candidate. The other 29 states and



Washington, D.C. do have laws against faithless electors. However, there has never been prosecution against them.

Because of this process, it is possible for a candidate to win the majority of votes, yet lose the election. Most recently, this happened in 2000 when George W. Bush lost by 543,816 votes to Al Gore. However, because Bush secured certain districts in Florida, he was able to take the whole state and, ultimately, the presidency.

The 2000 election was not the first time this happened. In total, four American presidents have lost the popular vote but won the presidency. George W. Bush, Benjamin Harrison, Rutherford B. Hayes and John Quincy Adams all lost the popular vote yet found themselves in the White House.

So the next time someone tells you every vote counts, just remember ... John Ewards.
