The Bismarck State College Student Union was abundant with activity on August 27 as new and returning students enjoyed the services provided on the first full day of classes for the Fall 2019 semester.

The bookstore saw an influx of students buying textbooks and apparel. Taped arrows on the floor assisted the staff of the bookstore in controlling the crowds going up and down the narrow staircase connecting the merchandise section to the section of textbooks.

At noon the tables and sitting spaces of the Student Union were filling up with student life, exploring all that the building could provide for them.

Burgers and hot dogs were grilled outside of the main dining area and provided to the bustling crowds.

Besides the long table of refreshments, members of CRU advertised their free

pizza event, which was scheduled for that night in the same location.

As students ate their fill, music and voices blared through the building from the level above the dining area.

Mystic Media's radio station, The MYX, jammed out in the corner by the newspaper rack to provide music, event awareness and giveaways to the passing groups.

New members of The MYX were thrown right into the DJ's chair on their first day to introduce themselves and become comfortable with performing live.

Entering college is a challenging and new experience for any student, but when asked about their feelings on a new stage in life, many new students exclaimed excitement over anxiety.

"Excited to meet a lot of new people—

make new friends," said new student Jackson Hellman as he entered his name in Mystic Media's raffle.

Passersby enthusiastically answered trivia questions about the State of North Dakota for a chance to win free drinks at the Student Union coffee shop, Mystic Java.

Aside from a productive first day of classes, the school has made large developments over the summer in terms of sports, infrastructure and degree programs.

Varsity Esports team to compete in games such as Fortnite, Overwatch, Hearthstone and League of Legends.

The Cybersecurity program announced in Spring Semester 2019 launches this academic year with almost 150 students enrolled according to BSC President Dr. Larry C. Skogen.

"There's an old saying that you can't be everything to everybody," Dr. Skogen said in response to the school's growth. "We do a pretty darn good job of whatever the community wants here, whatever the students in the community want ... I can't think of an area that a student can say 'This is what I want to do, and Bismarck State College has nothing to offer me in that area.'"

Dr. Skogen Reminisces on Accomplishments

The sun shined and the Missouri River gleamed outside the windows of the Bavendick Stateroom on the fourth floor of the National Energy Center of Excellence. As a crew set up an auxiliary location for a picnic in case of bad weather, President of Bismarck State College Dr. Larry C. Skogen revealed that it is his favorite room on all of campus.

"I would go up and drag a chair up to the windows on the fourth floor and stare out at the river and figure, how I was going to raise four and a half million dollars," he said and chuckled while reminiscing on a familiar view.

Dr. Skogen himself occupies a clean and knickknack-filled office on the third floor of the NECE building. An article was shown to him at the beginning of the interview about his official induction as president of BSC. He was quick to point

to a photo showing all of the collectibles that remained from that time as well as the new ones appropriated since then.

The article had been written by James Kruger in the March 2007 volume of *The Mystician*. A large quote jumped out to

Dr. Skogen from the pages that said "I think my position is to do whatever I can to make sure that people have the best resources to do their jobs the best."

"This is true here; I do whatever I can to make sure that people have the resources to do their jobs the best," Dr. Skogen said upon glancing at it.

In 12 years of his time spent at BSC that much has not changed. He would go on to circle those resources on a school map and explain them in detail. Over the

course of his presidency at BSC multiple buildings have been constructed on campus and many existing have received renovations.

"My predecessor actually started this building," he said, referring to the NECE, "When I got here there was a hole dug and a little foundation poured into it. So I got here and then we finished off the project, and then my big part in the project was to find the funding to finish off the fourth floor."

Dr. Skogen speaks fondly of that floor while clearly describing a time before there was even carpet installed. The Bavendick Stateroom and remaining rooms are now carpeted and furnished.

The NECE is not the only point of pride for the BSC President as he speaks to the inclusion of the new Health Sciences building, which finished remodeling in August, and the debut of the Cybersecurity program this semester.

"There's two sides to this equation: one, helping students achieve whatever they individually want to achieve," Dr. Skogen said on the expansion of polytechnic programs. "The other part of the equation is the needs of business and industries here in the state of North Dakota, and what are we doing to help them fill the vacancies that they have in employment."

The BSC president still has time left before his successor is determined and takes office. He exclaims excitement at the prospects that are held in store for the student body of now and the future as BSC continues to expand both physically and in the programs offered.

"I feel that I did everything I could do with the team, and it is a team effort," Dr. Skogen said. "It's not just me, it's the team working with wonderful support from the donors, legislature, the Foundation and business and industry. We've all worked collaboratively to end up with this beautiful, beautiful campus. So I'm very satisfied."

On Safety, Security and Student Involvement

With the school year just kicking off, students are back in the dorms and walking around on campus.

Day and night the campus is safe says Matthew Giddings, Head of Security at Bismarck State College. Giddings cautions that crime can happen anywhere and anytime. His two cents is to always keep your head on a swivel.

"So many of our students, so many of

our staff ... are in their phones," Giddings said. "The more you can tell of your surroundings, the easier it will be to keep yourself out of situations that you may feel uncomfortable."

President of the Student Government Association, RJ Tare, agrees. The main thing is to be aware of your surroundings.

Students walking at night, should plan their route and stay in well-lit areas. Crimes often happen because of an opportunity so the less opportunity given the safer students will be.

The SGA and Campus Security have been in talks since before the school year started on how to improve the safety of students on campus.

Giddings would like to see better signs around the crosswalks to demand more attention from drivers that someone may be crossing. At the corner of LEA Hall and Swenson cross-traffic doesn't stop because in wintertime it becomes difficult to start going again after stopping midway up the hill. Buildings and grounds have been working on the parking lots to make

them smoother and less hazardous to traverse.

Tare would like to see a Blue Phone implemented, in which students could call dispatch during the night when security is not available.

"Unfortunately BSC is not there [big enough] yet," Tare said.

Despite BSC being the third-largest college in the state, the Blue Phone is not yet feasible. Overall the campus is considered safe with only two reported crimes from the previous academic year.

Fire Emblem: Three Houses, The Art of War

YouTube personality and Game Reviewer, Joseph Anderson, says that the two ways to best judge a game is as a work of art or as a commercial product. Views of art are subjected and varied especially within the context of video games. A game can have mechanics that make it great to play with hours of content, but has very little personality or expression contained within. Another game could have the inverse true with gorgeous detail and aesthetic while lacking substantial content for the price or lack of fulfillment in the player upon completion. A majority of well received games feature both, and Nintendo does a fantastic job in this department.

Nintendo has proven itself as of late with mainline games of their storied series on their functional and semi-

portable console the Nintendo Switch. The world of Hyrule looks beautiful in "The Legend of Zelda: Breath of the Wild" with the physics engine and open ended exploration keeping it from going stale on the gameplay side. "Super Mario Maker" and "Super Mario Maker 2" take the aesthetic appeal of new and old Mario games while providing theoretically unlimited content for players and creators. Of all the party games, laid back adventures and indie hits available on the Switch though "Fire Emblem: Three Houses" stands out.

The "Fire Emblem" series of games already went through a facelift with the release of "Fire Emblem: Awakening" on the Nintendo 3Ds in 2012 that was praised critically and well received by fans. "Fire Emblem: Three Houses" outclasses "Fire Emblem: Awakening" in not just improving the long running title even further, but as a work of art.

The mechanics certainly make it a good

game by discarding the fairly unbalanced rock, paper, scissors style combat system. Exploring Garreg Mach Monastery, this games hubworld, to do quests and speak to your character's students between missions is enjoyable, adding depth and texture to a game through meaningful character interaction.

The combat has been enhanced by a battalion system to give an impression of real battle with unique combat abilities to get in just the right amount of damage or apply the opportune effect to an opponent. The gameplay and it's associated mechanics felt great and purposeful. All of this makes for a good game. "Three Houses" would still be considered art by virtue of being a video game, but there is more to solidify it as masterclass and worthy of that exact badge.

The world, character designs, lore, story and pacing blend equally as well as the mechanics do. Without being gritty as "Saving Private Ryan" or "Game of

Thrones" it manages to tell a thoughtful experience on the nature of war as well as examine whether or not we should place stock in the words and actions of people who assume to rule over us. The game hammers home the artistic elements with a gorgeous understanding of architecture and medieval art. As time passes in the game, each new moon (month) has lore regarding it narrated through a portrait reminiscent of medieval tapestry work. The lore itself is similar to a folktale with a religious influence blended in. Much of the players time will take place within a grand cathedral with architecture and stained glass evoking back to around roughly this same period.

Altogether, "Fire Emblem: Three Houses" becomes a must buy and classic in Nintendo's library with a new and improved look for the long running franchise and a tremendous experience worth playing, at least three times.

Some said that showering at night is like pouring milk before cereal. While others said showering in the morning is far superior to a night time wash.



Esports Arrives at Bismarck State College

Buildings and programs are not the only new face to have arrived to Bismarck State College for the 2019-2020 academic year. The BSC Athletics Department unveiled in a press conference held in the Missouri Room of the Student Union on July 9, the new varsity Esports program. Dr. Larry C. Skogen, President of Bismarck State College, as well as Buster Gillis, Director of Athletics, brought to light plans for the program that will begin practice in the Fall semester.

"Gaming is mainstream and implementing a team on campus allows us to bring those who may not always become involved in a sport or campus organization together," said Buster Gillis in a press release that day.

The press release announced the four games that would be played in a competitive setting by the newly formed team. The two competitive shooter games to be played are "Overwatch" a first person shooter (FPS) by Blizzard, the designer

and publisher of "Starcraft" and "World of Warcraft", and "Fortnite", a third person shooter and battle royale style game created by Epic Game Studios. Blizzard shares another game in the BSC game lineup in the form of collectible card game (CCG) "Hearthstone", which involves the strategic use of a handcrafted deck of virtual cards. Lastly, the popular multiplayer online battle arena (MOBA) "League of Legends" will have a team to contend. A poster for each game lined the walls around the Missouri Room which has been designated as the space to be used for team practice.

\$50,000 was set aside to be distributed as individual \$1000 scholarships for students admitted to the team. The Mystics will compete on a collegiate level against other ND state educational institutions such as Dickinson State University, Minnesota State University Moorehead and the University of Jamestown. Any other Esports programs in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) will be competed against as well.
