



Andrew Klein is a current Bismarck State College student who is getting a liberal arts transfer degree. He is going to further educated himself at the University of Minnesota in the Twin Cities, for their Cinema and Media Culture Studies program. When he's not working on short films, he's working at Dakota Media Access, H&M, and is the State Communication's Director for the College Democrats of North Dakota and the Vice President of the chapter at BSC.

DK- How did you get into filmmaking?

AK- When I was in the seventh grade, I saw the movie Super 8, and I don't know why but that movie really hit me. I was like you know what, I love movies, I should do this for a

I remember a short time after that. I watched a short film made by stop motion animation out of the plastic army men, and it was so well made and [I] remember thinking oh, I could do that.

DK-Last year you made two short films that were entered in the Dakota Film Festival. One for the Dakota Digital Dash, and one for the festival itself, do you want to explain what those films were?

AK- The first one, "Where's AI," was basically a product of calling up a friend and deciding to make a short film together. We hadn't talked in like two and a half years, but we had a video production class in high school, we both took it seriously and made a really good team.

I called him up and we made it for fun, and on the side decided to submit it to the film festival. The other film we made was called "Pleasant Lake" and that one was for the Dakota Digital Dash, which is a contest where teams enter and everyone is assigned the same character, same line of dialogue, and same prop. But the difference is the genre which was drawn out of a hat. We were assigned mockumentary, which when we were getting assigned to was the one I was hoping for.

DK- The film "Pleasant Lake" also won some awards from the Digital Dash, what were those awards for? AK- We won best use of character and we won best writing. Best writing was won by like committee, because all of us wrote that thing. All of the things that are funny are from joking around on set and deciding to add those jokes into the film.

DK-What are you currently working

AK- "The First Day" is a short film that I wanted to make it feel unique. I don't want it to be regarded as a discount feature film. It's about a wedding that takes place on the last day of the world's existence and about a small group of people that are trying to make the best of it. When you first start a film with a newscast saying the world is ending,

it's automatically a Michael Bay film with a Hans Zimmer soundtrack, and it's this big action disaster movie. But instead of doing that, we use that as a backdrop and tell a more personal story. You could almost say we are genre blending because we are taking a drama/romance setting that would be normally reserved for a big action movie. I don't remember where I got the idea for the end of the world, but I felt like it would be a good idea to raise the stakes.

DK- What was the difference in the process of making this film compared to the other two?

AK- Oh it's huge, we had so much time. We were also more sure of ourselves. With "Where's Al" I didn't have a lot of confidence in myself and learned as I went. Now that we have done two, I have more confidence in

myself and we've gotten feedback on them. I know my strengths and weaknesses and can watch out for

DK- How long did the filming process take?

AK- We are not done with the film yet, but overall it took a month. Pretty much the whole month of July.

DK- When do you expect to finish this and have it out by?

AK- It's done when it's done. But no, we wrote in May, planned in June, filmed in July, and edited it in August. Ideally, I want to get it done by the end of October.

DK-What are you planning on doing after this film?

AK- I think I want to take some time to make stuff that's not a part of a big project. I might just work on some small stuff, do some writing. The end goal is to move to Los Angeles and have all my films to show for my work, get a job as a production assistant and move my way up the

ONE DROP HELPS

Approximately 40,000 pints of blood are used in the United States each day according to the website, Blood Source. However, fewer than one in ten people donate their blood. One donation has the potential of helping as many as three lives.

People who are interested may visit one of Bismarck's two facilities, United Blood Services and BioLife Plasma Services. Blood has a limited shelf life of when it may be used, so donations are always needed.

The process is easy and fast, with donations usually taking around an hour to do. Appointments are required at each facility. The donor will be asked several basic

questions regarding their health. Their blood may be sampled to make sure that the donor is healthy and capable of giving away fluids.

Professionals are there to take care of the donor in a relaxed setting. Students may also receive payments for their blood donations depending on the company. The blood donations are then sent to where they are needed locally and statewide. Recovery can differ from person to person, but usually the donor is asked to wait eight weeks before donating again. This is a safety precaution just to allow the body of the donor to reproduce more blood.

CYBERSECURITY OFFERS OPPORTUNITIES IN ND

Cybersecurity is a new program provided to students at Bismarck State College. The training will teach students how to protect civilians against criminals trying to infiltrate their information.

Many different agencies are looking for qualified candidates to secure our computer networks, that way private information will not escape, and people will remain secure on the internet.

"Cybersecurity is one of the most exciting career paths on the BSC campus this year. We have students that can work for the state, work for a business, or out of state," Associate Professor of Computers and Office Technology, Matt Frohlich said. "Some jobs require students to work with both hardware and software, but many of them can also get job opportunities in hardware or software."

There are many different degree options for a student planning on going into cybersecurity.

"Students that want to finish early and enter the job force could look for an Associate in Applied Science degree," Frohlich said. "Students that want to enjoy life a bit more, could look into the three year degree. In the fall of 2019, we will offer a Bachelor of Applied Science degree for students looking to hold supervisor or managerial positions."

There is no background in computers needed, but it is recommended in this

degree and career path.

"A background in technology is not required, but it is efficient in cybersecurity classes and in the workforce," Frohlich said. Many students are taking advantage of this new and exciting opportunity.

"This program has been going good. I have always had an interest in

cybersecurity," Austin Hawkinson, a sophomore at BSC, said. "The teachers have been great and are passionate."

Hawkinson says he does not know where he plans to work after he finishes his bachelor's degree, but he does have an internship at MDU Resources and enjoys it so far. There are many different opportunities with cybersecurity and the professors welcome questions from anyone interested in this career path.

"The first semester is learning the basic requirements of technology," Frohlich said. "You have to be a lifelong learner in this career field."



Justin Johnson works on his computer.



FREEDOM OF THE PRESS HAS BECOME A DOMAIN OF CONFUSION

The news is changing every day. From different news stories such as climate change, to celebrities doing absurd things, to how journalists are supposed to write an article the correct way. In the U.S. Constitution, the First Amendment explains Freedom of Speech and Freedom of the Press. Now, with news writing changing constantly, how does Freedom of the Press compare in today's society?

Back in the year 1776, Americans wanted their independence from Great Britain. The British government attempted to cut out all ties with the newspapers, that way information wouldn't get out about the situation. Soon after, Freedom of the Press was brought into the First Amendment on Dec. 15, 1791, according to the History Channel website, history.com.

In today's world where technology ratings are at their highest, Freedom of the Press has caused some concerns about

In the past, print and broadcast spoke and wrote about all sides, so everyone

knew what was happening. Now with social media, individuals can comment when they don't like the opinion and report it to be taken down.

According to the Freedom House website, freedomhouse.org, press freedom

has dropped in major countries around the world. On the website's global map, the countries that enjoy their Freedom of Speech and Freedom of the Press include the United States, Ireland, the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia and the Scandinavian countries. That is less than 15 percent of the world's population that allows press freedom.

At the beginning of September, two journalists were sentenced to seven years in prison for investigating the killings in Myanmar, Southeast Asia. This is one example of suppression of the press that occurs around the world.

Freedom of the Press gives United States citizens their independence on what they want to write and what they want people to know. This part of the First Amendment protects the important information society uses to keep Americans up to date.

Press freedom is not only a privilege, but also a right. Journalists around the world deserve to give information to society without the fear of being incarcerated.

NAMING NOSTALIGIA

The Mystician is celebrating its monumental Volume 80 this year. With the different volumes and the revolving staff, many changes happen each year.

The Mystician has been through a lot the past few years, it went from being a newspaper to magazine, and then back to a newspaper.

When looking at previous volumes, it tends be very nostalgic. It's as though each year is a time capsule—opening it reveals the news and opinions of a class long before our time.

The Mystician was first published on Friday, Dec. 20, 1946.

Originally it wasn't named The Mystician, it was called "U Name It," opting for students to come up with BJC's first newspaper's title, by putting in an entry blank in and having students write in what they think it should be called.

A four-page paper, which could be

purchased for ten cents, was jam packed full of stories on each page. One of the biggest stories that year was "1946 Biggest Year Yet for Junior College," which detailed the enrollment of supposed education hungry veterans. It set the record for largest enrollment at the time with 285 new students.

The article also went on to include the many firsts of that year, including the first football team, the first newspaper, and the first homecoming.

When looking back at the paper and it's first issue, the changes that have been made are extraordinary. From then to current day, whether it be what the students reported, the name, format, or the style of writing and how all of that changed, one thing that never will is that The Mystician will always give a voice to the students.






LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



BLACK HAWK DOWN

When I first read the book, "Black Hawk Down," I expected it to be the same as the film. Prior to reading the book, I had only seen the movie, but the book exceeded all of my expectations. It gave me a different outlook on America's occupation in Somalia and the Battle of Mogadishu. At the beginning of the book, it tells about the early stages of the Battle of Mogadishu, on Oct. 3, 1993. The Delta Force, Army Rangers, 160th SOAR (Special Operations Aviation Regiment) and Navy SEALs (Sea, Air and Land)

approached Mogadishu in helicopters, humvees and trucks. They were going to pick up warlord Mohamed Farrah Aidid's two lieutenants and top political advisor. There were over 160 soldiers in the city, the mission was supposed to be no more than five minutes. However that did not happen, Somalis shot down a Black Hawk helicopter resulting in the deaths of both pilots and injury of two other people. Within minutes, a second helicopter was shot down by RPG fire, causing American soldiers to be pinned down and trapped within the city. By the next morning, 18

Americans were dead, 73 were wounded and pilot Michael Durant had been captured by the Somali military. On the other side, the Somalis' body count was over 1,000.

The book tells a solemn story of the deadly firefight that took place in 1993. It was very action-packed and historically accurate. Author Mark Bowden visited Somalia in 1999 in order to bring the story to light.

I personally loved this book and recommend it to others, because of how action-packed and historically detailed

it is. It went into great depth about the people involved on both sides of the battle. Bowden portrayed the military operations accurately and many Somalis and American soldiers praise him for it. It changed my view on the war, the way I look at politics, and the way I see the United States Military. I once saw the United States as an invincible force that couldn't be weakened, but this book shows how any nation with strength can be brought to its knees.




