

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IS YOUR INFORMATION SAFE?

Increased technology usage led to the rise of the digital world. However, scams and the exposure of personal data online has made the need for cybersecurity increase as well.

Bismarck State College's cybersecurity program has grown to address technology security needs. In the fall of 2016, an Associate of Applied Science degree in Cybersecurity and Computer Networks was developed by adding more security training into the curriculum of the previous I.T. program. A BAS degree program has since been introduced.

With the help of California based Palo Alto Networks, a major cybersecurity company, BSC's cybersecurity program is training students to protect information, recognize the difference between spam and phishing messages, identify fraud and keep up with the ever-changing digital world.

"There's just a lot of things that have to be done to keep things secure," said Assistant Professor of Cybersecurity Nick See.

Cybersecurity is described as the application of security within data and computing. It all boils down to keeping sensitive data such as usernames and passwords, credit card and personal information, networks, devices and other data from being compromised.

"The best way I would describe [cybersecurity] is basically being a police officer of the internet," said Connor Grahl, a junior in BSC's cybersecurity bachelor program.

One of the most common types of cyber attacks are phishing related scams, which are emails with urgent links that bring up a bogus site that looks legitimate. Any usernames and passwords entered on this fake site can be stolen by attackers.

"The chances are pretty good you use the same username and same password on multiple sites," said See. "So, therefore now they have your access on multiple sites."

Carol Flaa, the Chief Information Officer at BSC, works closely with all departments on campus to make sure that technology needs are met. She explained that BSC has a cybersecurity team that meets weekly to plan and prepare the annual required employee training on cybersecurity.

"Cybersecurity is very important in today's world," Flaa said. "Everyone at some point uses the internet and needs to be cyber smart."

The cybersecurity team hosts events to educate students and employees about two-factor authentication, email phishing, the importance of strong passwords and more.

"The cyber scams that I have seen happen are usually with students," Flaa said. "They fall for a phishing scam offering them a great job or asking them to buy gift cards. There's been a few times students have lost several hundreds of dollars before they realized they were scammed. Unfortunately, at that point when they realize and report it, it's too late, and there's no way to get their money back."

Cyber attacks can be prevented in many ways. Users should run software updates on their devices. Waiting a few days before installing updates can give developers time to catch and fix bugs. Anti-malware software such as Malwarebytes or Windows Defender can also prevent cyber threats.

Giving out as little information as possible online can help reduce the amount of personal data lost in the event of an attack. Using a good

username and password will reduce the chance of accounts being hacked. A good password should be lengthy: at least 12 characters or more. Using phrases or full sentences are an easy way to remember long passwords while making them as secure as possible.

Also, storing data on a device gives users more control over the information, while data stored in the cloud makes the user reliant on a company.

"That's the hard part about what's going on with computing today," said See. "Your data doesn't belong to you. It belongs to someone else, and you have to rely on that someone else to secure that information."

MYSTIC MARKETPLACE OFFERS GLUTEN-FREE MEAL OPTIONS

Some people enjoy dieting. Some have no other choice. That is why the Mystic Marketplace is introducing more options.

Chris Warner, the Food Service Operation Manager at Bismarck State College said some students are too shy to discuss their dietary restrictions such as celiac disease. However, he said that he knows there are those with allergies to certain foods.

"They don't want to feel like imposing, and that's the biggest problem. They feel like they're being a bother," Warner said. "And they're not being a bother, it's just, they have to eat and I totally understand that."

According to Dr. Joseph Murray, a Mayo Clinic gastroenterologist, evidence shows that celiac disease is becoming more common. Data from the Celiac Disease Foundation says that 1 in 100 people have the disease but only 30% are properly diagnosed.

Sometimes, it takes years for celiac disease to show up. It can be a hard transition. One day, an individual is enjoying fried foods and cake. Then the next thing they know, they're checking every ingredient on the back of every item they buy. Eating in the cafeteria can be another challenge.

As of right now, the Marketplace offers gluten-free pizzas, buns and various desserts. Warner wants to bring in more items so those with allergies are able to have more options. Warner said he needs to know what dietary

restrictions people may have to help everyone enjoy a hot meal.

"I don't know any of the other dietary concerns. So, that's kind of a problem," Warner said. "I don't know if there's dairy or other items that they can't have. So, that's a part of the problem—if they don't come to me, I don't know."

More gluten-free items are expected to appear on the Mystic Marketplace menu in the future.

If any students would like to see a certain food item at the campus cafeteria, it could be as simple as a request to the chef.

TENNIS COURTS' DEMISE LEADS TO POLYTECHNIC EXPANSION

With the whirring and thrashing of excavators, the tennis courts and the surrounding trees were torn out of the ground, leaving piles of dirt, dust and rock in their wake. What lies ahead with this sudden change in atmosphere and what does it bring next? That is up to those in Administration at Bismarck State College.

The two tennis courts, located between the National Energy Center of Excellence and the BSC Armory were demolished in November 2022, clearing the way for the upcoming polytechnic facility.'

A groundbreaking ceremony took place in the Basin Electric Auditorium inside the BSC National Energy Center of Excellence on Nov. 29.

BSC President Doug Jensen and North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum where amongst those that spoke at the groundbreaking ceremony.

Gov. Burgum praised the project's concept of equipping students with the skills and degrees ready for local demand, saying that education has to be more responsive to workforce needs.

"If the private sector is sending signals that we need more nurses, we need more power plant operators, we need more folks that understand advanced material science, we need more UAS operators — you name all the fields we have, and we need schools who are helping provide those career paths for our young people," Burgum said in a November 2022 press release.


Since then, construction on the new facility has progressed. Crews spent much of November clearing debris from the site, such as leftover concrete from the courts and trees.

December was spent digging out a space for the building despite heavy snowfall from two major blizzards and bitter cold conditions.

The Polytechnic building will include hands-on labs and project-based classes where students can collaborate







Since 2018, BSC has dedicated itself to transitioning into a polytechnic institute, commissioning studies with the National Coalition of Advanced Technology and Gray Associates to determine the skills needed in the North Dakota workforce to prepare students for industry jobs.

"North Dakota needs a mechanism to ensure we have the highly skilled workforce our public and private sector stakeholders need to continue to sustain and grow our economy. BSC is now positioned to build the talent pipeline that will impact the economy now and for many years into the future," Jensen said in a story published in December 2021 on the BSC website.

Gov. Burgum signed Senate Bill 2345 in 2021 which granted BSC \$38 million from state fiscal funds for the construction of the facility.

The project is estimated to be completed and opened in time for the fall 2024 semester.

FUE, NDFU FUND INSTRUCTOR
TRAINING FOR FARM
MANAGEMENT EDUCATION

BISMARCK, N.D – The North Dakota Farm Management Education Association was given \$10,000 from the Farmers Union Enterprises (FUE) in 2022.

These funds are being used for mentoring new and early career Farm Management Education (FME) instructors across four tech colleges in North Dakota, including Bismarck State College. FUE has provided \$50,000 over the past decade.

Funding for FME programs in North Dakota is supported by the North Dakota Career and Technical Education Department.

BSC AGRICULTURE RECIEVES
CHS FOUNDATION GRANT

BISMARCK, N.D. – BSC's agriculture program was awarded a \$79,141 grant from a long standing partnership with the CHS Foundation, who have invested in BSC Agriculture programs and students since 2000.

The funding is aimed at revitalizing current programs and to purchase new state-of-the-art equipment to be implemented in the Agriculture Systems Management course curriculum.

This will give students handson experiences in industry related skills in electronics, hydraulics, automation, robotics and sensor technology.

Students will be proficient in diagnostic equipment, reading electrical schematics, operating electrical control devices, and more after completing the program.

Virtual Restaurants work exclusively with the intent of delivering food through online services.

Tare used his baking skills to start his virtual bakery. He started Facebook and Instagram accounts where he posts pictures of his macarons.

Tare offers a wide range of flavors, from standard flavors like red velvet to more unique flavors like cosmic brownie, fruity pebble and milky way.

While he also has a website, RJ says he prefers to use direct messaging services on his social media pages for customers to make orders while supplies are limited.

Tare was able to start serving at

events with the support of his family and the community.

He has served events such as bridal showers and fundraising for organizations like Dakota OutRight, a group dedicated to finding a safe space for those in the LGBTQIA community.

Balancing a small business and being a full-time student, along with having a part-time serving job, has been difficult for Tare. He is also considering attending graduate school.

Tare said this could affect the fate of his business if it gets in the way of his life goals. Despite this, Tare believes expansion is inevitable. "I think it's just bound to happen,"
Tare said. "COVID happened and
people realized how restrictive it is

just a website. Rather, it will be another
tool to make more profits."

SEEDS OF HOPE OFFERS AFFORDABLE SHOPPING AND SERVICES TO THE COMMUNITY

Seeds of Hope offers affordable shopping and services to the community.

Thrift stores have more than one function. On one hand they are businesses that offer repurposed items such as clothes, decor, and furniture. On the other hand, they often exist to help folks down on their luck. Most thrift stores are attached to some kind of charity.

Seeds of Hope is one of these stores and also an affordable option when students are looking for room decor or fashionable clothing. It is one of the largest thrift stores in the Bismarck-Mandan area and has been in business for nearly three decades.

"The store is part of the Abused Adult Resource Center," store manager Lisa Ternes said. "Back when the agency started, the donations were for the women and children, and they also had safe homes."

The Abused Adult Resource Center,

which runs the store, offers many services, which include advocating for victims of sexual assault, a family safety center, a womens shelter, transition centers and apartments for single women. Services offered by the organization are all funded by the Seeds of Hope store, and grants.

The store offers an individual customer experience. Ternes said the merchandise is one of those distinctive elements, and many of these items may hold sentimental value for people.

"The items in the store are unique because there is only one of that item. You see it, you gotta buy it-there aren't ten of them. They are one-of-a-kind," Ternes said.

Seeds of Hope is located on the corner of Main Avenue and North 6th Street in downtown Bismarck. Information about the store can also be found on Facebook, and on the AARC website.

Seeds of Hope also offers a loyalty program to customers and all profits go to charity.



Samantha Meehl of Oakes, N.D. was fifth in the state in Class B discus last season. She has personal bests of 110-9 in the discus and 35-0.5 in the shot.

Brody Ferderer is a Class A all-state runner and has been all-conference

three times in cross-country. The Bismarck Century High School athlete was 10th in cross-country last season.

Ferderer also will run distance events in track. Ferderer's best times are 10:06 in the 3,200 meters and 16:19 in 5K cross-country.

Ivar Martell, from Bismarck Legacy High School, a two-time Class A allconference runner in cross-country, posted a 16:13 over 5K and just missed earning all-state honors.

Martell's 4x800 relay team took sixth at State Track. Martell has posted a 4:35 in the 1,600 meters and 2:02 in the 800.

Softball

Women's Head Softball Coach Kurt Grensteiner announced the signing of Sophia Wood from Kelly Walsh High School in Casper, Wyo.

Wood is a right-handed pitcher and shortstop and a two-time all-state selection.

Wood's career batting averaging is .379 with a .509 on-base percentage and .632 slugging percentage. She has 26 stolen bases.

In the field, she has a .961 fielding percentage at shortstop. As a pitcher, she has an .846 winning percentage with 132 strikeouts and a 3.36 earned run average.





It can make it hard to find people to talk to, or catch people in a time when they aren't very busy. And it doesn't help that I'm busy all the time, too.


Overall, I've really been enjoying the internship. It's been a great way to measure how much interest I actually have in an area of journalism I've always been interested in.
